## Ambulance strike settled

Ambulance workers in Stouffville and Uxbridge returned to the job Monday after settling a labor dispute that lasted over six weeks.

A tentative agreement was struck in mediation on Thursday, then ratified by the workers in a strong majority, Friday.

The nine full-time and six part-time ambulance attendants are to

receive a total 10 per cent wage increase, which will bring their salary up to \$11.59 an hour by the time their contract expires March 31, 1986.

Before walking off the job on Aug. 19, they earned \$10.50 an hour compared to \$11.78 by drivers employed directly by the Ministry of Health.

The Ontario Public Service Em-

ployees' Union (OPSEU) represented the workers in negotiations for wage and benefit parity with Ministry workers. The Stouffville-Uxbridge employees had been without a contract since Jan. 1.

A provincial mediator was called in to oversee bargaining with several privately-owned but provincially-funded ambulance units, including the local operator Whitby-Bowmanville Ambulance Service.

Its owners, Bill Cocker and Derek Pearce, maintained that their ability to increase salaries is controlled by the amount of provincial funding they receive.

Mr. Rooney said it's likely OPSEU will be back representing the workers at the bargaining table by year's end.

"They haven't gained parity, but they have made substantial gains," he stated. "And we'll be looking to close the gap completely."

The union representative admitted another strike is possible, but said "hopefully it will be a last resort."

The Stouffville-Uxbridge employees have also been granted increased benefits such as a meal allowance. But they failed to win the dental or vision plans already available to health ministry attendants.

"The employees are determined to win parity," Mr. Rooney said. "If local management was reasonable and could see the logic of parity, there would be no need for a strike."
