

# Candidate Daphne Goldman Flexes muscles

STOUFFVILLE — Equality of education (or inequality of education) was forcefully stressed by trustee candidate Daphne Goldman at an All-Candidates Meeting before a student audience of Grades 9, 12 and 13 at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School, Friday.

Speaking with down-to-earth authority that held the attention of listeners, Mrs. Goldman pointed to the nine million dollar high school recently opened at Unionville, calling it "a real show place." "And you have speed bumps," she added, "aren't you grateful?"

The trustee candidate agreed Unionville required a high school, "but not a nine million dollar high school."

brought in on a part-time basis to fill this vacuum.

Mrs. Goldman hit a responsive chord with many students when she suggested a lounge, (not a smoking lounge), be established in the school where students could gather for fellowship and conversation. It would be the responsibility of the students themselves to furnish it and keep it clean, she said.

The speaker outlined her involvement with young people in the community. She mentioned specifically the Whitechurch-Stouffville Youth Club and the H.S. Variety Show.

Trustee candidate John McMurray praised the High

School's new Code of Ethics and commended the teaching staff on their concern and dedication. He recommended additional total school involvement through festival programs in the areas of music, hobbies and crafts.

If elected, he said he'd be willing to enter into discussions with both staff and students on any issues or problems that might arise, either in a group situation or one-on-one.

### Cites Experience

Incumbent trustee Harry Bowes told of his years' experience with the Board and the respect he had gained from fellow trustees at Aurora.

He cited his involvement in the community, activities that include the Lions Club, the Legion, the Markham-Stouffville Hospital Board, the Minor Hockey Association and others.

### High Standing

Trustee candidate Ron Shuker described the student forum as "democracy in action." He praised the accomplishments of the 1984-85 Grade 13 class, noting that 20 out of 73 graduates were Ontario Scholars, third highest record in the Region of York. He challenged other Grade 13's to match it.

STOUFFVILLE — Friday was not a good day for Ward 1 candidate Margot Marshall.

She attended the student pre-election forum at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School, but arrived at its conclusion.

The Cedar Valley incumbent said she'd never received a formal invitation and when she enquired, she was given the time of 3 p.m. instead of two

With respect to education, Mrs. Goldman said students are better able than anyone to judge what the system has to offer and what it lacks.

UXBRIDGE — Lloyd Thornton Wilson of Uxbridge was promoted to glory, Monday, Oct. 28, 1985.

Lloyd was born April 11, 1940, on the family farm, north of Uxbridge, to Hilliard and Ruby Wilson. He was the youngest of seven boys.

Lloyd attended Uxbridge Secondary School, Reich American School of Auctioneering, Emmanuel Bible College and Sir Wilfrid Laurier University.

In 1966, Lloyd married Olive Raymer of Toronto. They resided in Kitchener where Lloyd worked as Public Relations Director at Emmanuel Bible College from 1965 to 1971. During this time, Lloyd continued with his auction business in Uxbridge and in 1971, Lloyd and family returned to the family home in Uxbridge where he operated a dairy farm of Holstein cattle.

Here, Lloyd became very involved in the Uxbridge Baptist Church where he served as the teacher of the Adult Bible Class as well as deacon of the church many years.

In 1979, Lloyd recognized the need for auction facilities and built the Wilson's Sales Arena to accommodate Holstein cattle sales, July, 1983.

marked Lloyd's 25th year of auctioneering, an occasion that was celebrated with a breakfast and a cattle sale of select Holsteins at the Sales Arena.

Lloyd was known across Canada for his superb speaking ability and was in much demand for functions such as church anniversaries, school assemblies, seminars, agricultural meetings and banquets, and various other groups.

Lloyd was a loving and faithful husband and father whose life was a fine example for his family by his many accomplishments and deep Christian faith. His wife, Olive, and five children, Sharon, Graham, Craig, Dawn Marie and Stephanie are thankful to God for the influence of such a wonderful man.

He is sadly missed by his family, his wife and children; his dad and mother; his brothers, Jim and Dorothy, Harold and Kit, Ivan and Gladys; Clarence and Helen; Fred and Helen; Ken and Jean; and his many nieces and nephews.

Lloyd's promotion service was held at Uxbridge Baptist Church, Oct. 31, 1985 at 2 p.m., at which, many of his friends participated.
