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Bizarre set up for basketball

The potential problem stems from the season games. Technically there is no regular season. Instead, each of the 16 teams will play exhibition matches, and be seeded by the convenor for the playoffs in February.

But Unionville High School coach Bob McRoberts pointed out that seeding will be "tough to do properly" because some teams have 15 games scheduled and others only eight.

"Unless the convenors schedule more games," he added, "And some teams are interested in more."

Despite his worry, McRoberts is happy to see the region grouped into one big league, instead of the former practice of splitting it into North and South divisions.
