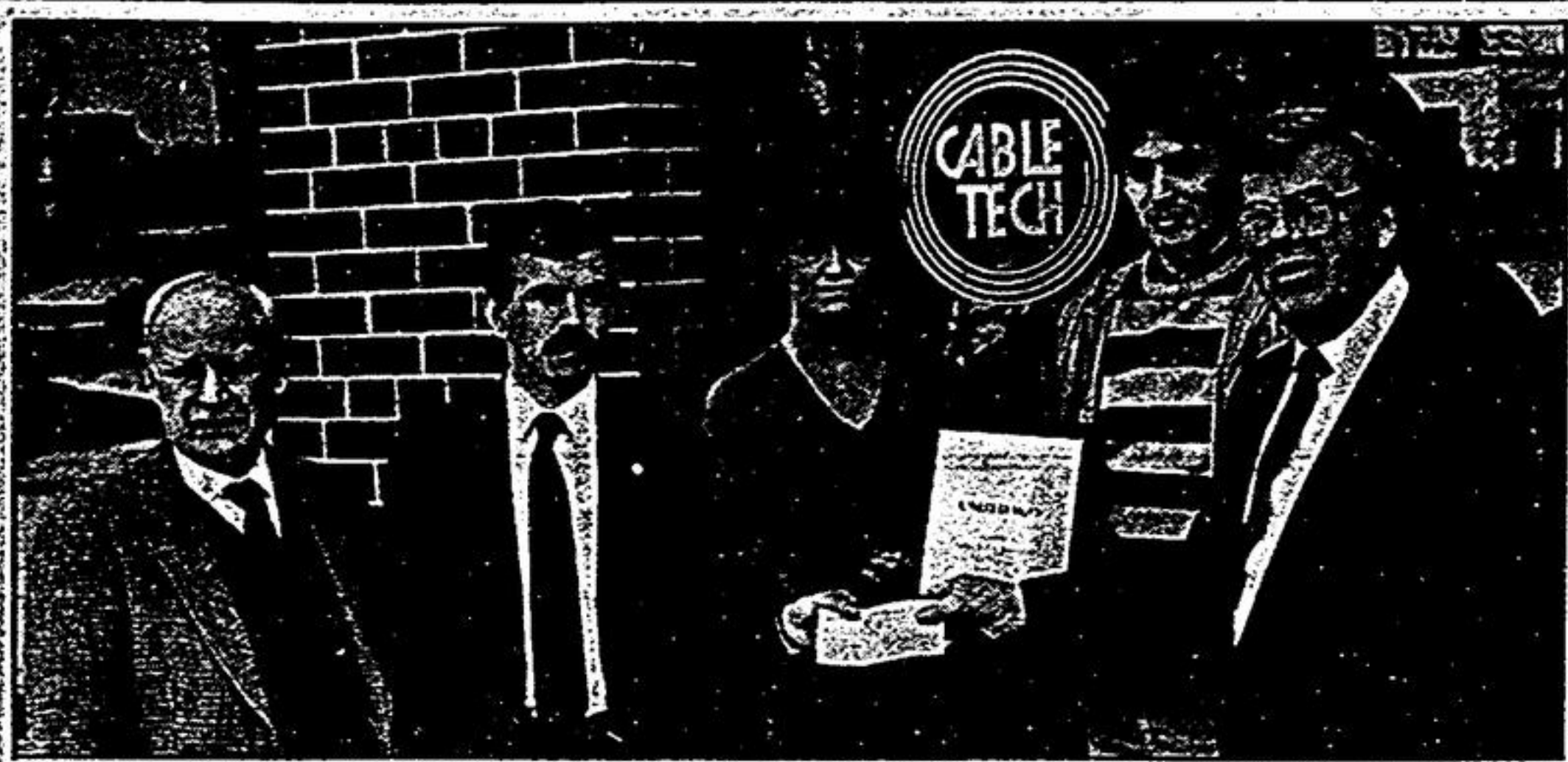


Roman days re-lived

A 72 per cent error

Dear Jim:
Thank you for printing a short news item in your paper of Dec. 4 highlighting the Parkview Village project.

May I draw your attention to errors in the news item.

First, you mention eight per cent of the respondents of an earlier housing need survey recommended an auditorium. The correction is that eighty per cent (80%) responded expressing their opinion that an auditorium would contribute greatly to the lives of

persons living in the project. Second, you state the cost of the auditorium and amenity space is \$300,000.

This is incorrect. In actual fact, the portion of the total building not funded in the Federal Government insured loan of \$7,118,000 is \$650,000. The Parkview funded portion includes the auditorium and related amenity areas.

Also, the \$300,000 fund drive is now only \$70,000 short of the goal. I was also a bit surprised in an

article on the same page, to see I was quoted as "blessing" the Pentecostal churches for plans for a seniors' complex.

While I do wish them well and have in fact offered to be of assistance in a consultative capacity if needed, I do not think I really have the Divine authority to "bless" their project!
