

Novice Clippers bow out of Silverstick

The Neil Patrick Novice Clippers failed to advance to the second round of the International Silverstick tournament despite outstanding individual efforts last week.

The young hockey team came away from the Midland tourney with one win and two narrow losses. Stouffville succumbed to host team Midland 4-3 and 3-1 to Collingwood, before razing Woodbridge 5-1.

PRIDHAM SCORES TWO GOALS

In the opener against Midland, Clipper captain Phil Pridham gave his team a 2-1 first period lead. Pridham's first goal came straight from the faceoff when he broke through the Midland de-

fence and beat the goalkeeper to the corner.

Three minutes later, Midland tied the game. However, Stouffville jumped ahead on a nice pass from defenceman Geoff Smith to Pridham who made no mistake in finding the net.

SMITH WINS MVP HONORS

Midland added three more goals by the third period for a 4-2 lead. Smith narrowed the gap on a solo effort with three minutes remaining. Still, Midland held out for the win.

Smith received Most Valuable Player honors for his effort.

Collingwood took a 3-0 lead against the Clippers in the second frame of game two. However

Smith fired a hard shot late in the period to spoil the shut out and threaten a Clipper comeback.

It never materialized despite some good chances. Clipper goalie Greg Sanford was named M.V.P. for his outstanding net acrobatics. Teammates Lindsay Haylow and Sean Morrison were equally impressive.

GOAL BINGE

The local squad went on a goal binge in their final tangle with Woodbridge. Smith tallied for two and Roger McMann slapped home a single to give Stouffville an early 3-0 lead. Linemate David Mountjoy assisted on Smith's second goal.

Woodbridge made it 3-1 before Smith belted his hat trick marker

to quell any comeback attempts. Centre John McKinnon put the game away when he cracked home a shot after being set up by wingers Ryan Jefferson and Haylow.

McMann captured M.V.P. honors.

The Clippers host Pickering Village at the Rec Centre in Stouffville, Friday night at 7 p.m.

The extent of the damage can seldom be determined in the first 24 hours after injury, but first aid treatment at the time of injury will greatly affect the player's recovery time. Upon injury, remove the player from competition, elevate the injured leg and apply ice with compression (with a tensor bandage).

After icing for 20 minutes, the muscle should be gently stretched by bending the knee with the limits of pain. This should not be attempted in the case of a severe contusion or more damage may result.

MUSCLE STRAINS

Muscle strains or pulls commonly occur in the groin and hamstring muscles. Treatment is the same as above.

Ligaments, the connective bands attaching one bone to another across joints, provide joint stability. However, these ligaments can be sprained when they are excessively stretched, due to forced movement of a joint beyond its normal range.

Predominant ligament injuries in hockey are to the knees, acromioclavicular joint (at the point of the shoulder) and ankle. Knee injuries are usually caused by a forceful blow to the outside of the joint, or by hyperextension.

A shoulder separation is usually caused by a collision with the boards or another player, or by falling forcibly on an outstretched hand. Ice and compression, with elevation, is the first aid treatment for these types of ankle and knee injuries.

INCREASE IN NECK INJURIES

There has been a large increase in the number of spinal cord injuries in hockey since the late 1970s. No cases had been reported in studies done before 1977, but since then over 50 cases have been reported in Canada.

The majority of these injured players are now confined to wheelchairs. The most common cause of their neck injuries is a check from behind, and the hitting of the player's head against the boards while the neck is flexed.

It's been hypothesized that the game's greater speed and competitiveness are the causes of this increase in spinal injuries. With advances in equipment design, players now seem to have a possibly dangerous feeling of invincibility.

Other mentioned factors are the poor enforcement of existing rules and lack of rules against checking from behind.

Immediate treatment of these injuries is very delicate and can have far reaching effects. It is quite possible for the bones to be fractured while the spinal column remains intact. To avoid further injury, the helmet should not be removed. Nor should the head and neck be moved.

Skilled assistance is necessary to move the player to stretcher and transport to hospital.
