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WHITCHURCH — Mayor Fran Sainsbury, for one, is pleased the province has given the 'green light' to an in-depth Health Study for Whitchurch-Stouffville.

"It will remove the cloud of doubt that's been hanging over our heads," Mayor Sainsbury told The Tribune.

The cost has been placed at \$487,000.

The end result will determine if the health of residents has been adversely affected by chemicals from the now-closed Hwy. 48 landfill site.

WHITCHURCH — Mayor Fran Sainsbury says the Study sets a precedent in Ontario due to the fact the terms of reference were established by the people.

Mayor Sainsbury says all's been quiet on the citizens' front late because the people have been patient, fully believing the province would follow through on its promise.

"Pollution problems aren't unique to Whitchurch-Stouffville," Mrs. Sainsbury said. "It's happening all over the world, wherever man has been negligent in the use of chemicals."

Study is expected to take 15 months to complete. A four-member team has been appointed to oversee the project—Debbie Mitchell and Ann Gagnon of the Concerned Citizens Committee; Mayor Fran Sainsbury and Dr. John Hodgkinson, Associate Medical Officer of Health for the Region of York. An information office will be opened in Stouffville.

Mayor Sainsbury says the Study will be one of the most thorough ever undertaken and will serve as a prototype for other municipalities and provinces.

She's hopeful the conclusions will put residents' concerns to rest. "We're all working together for a common good," she said, "not in confrontation but in co-operation."

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
