A family tradition for Fair president

MARKHAM — One family's close association with the Markham and East York Agricultural Society continues. Mary Cosburn, R.R. 2, Markham, is the 1986 President of Markham Fair. Her election, by a unanimous vote of the directors, concluded the Society's annual meeting Wednesday night. Mrs Cosburn follows in the footsteps of her husband, the late Howard Cosburn, her son, Mac and son-in-law, Dennis Seeley. Mr Cosburn Sr. was president in 1965; Mac in 1979 and Dennis in 1981. Mrs Cosburn, in accepting the position, thanked the executive and directors for their confidence and trust. "I consider it a privilege and an honor," she said.

She promised an openness to new ideas and asked for co-operation in the weeks ahead. The prime goal of the board and its committees should be to promote agricultural activities and rural life through the Fair, she said. Upcoming Fair dates are Oct. 1 to 5. Elected to the position of 1st Vice-President was Rick Wannop, R.R. 2, Markham and 2nd Vice-President, Dave Morrison, 16th Avenue, Markham. Doris Thomas, Church Street, Markham, is the new President of the Ladies Section. Elected senior directors were Harvey Brown, Terry Boag,

Douglas Savage, Bob Elliot, Dave Morrison and Bill Boyes. Elected junior directors were Steve Grove, Russ Brown, Linda Lewis, Chris Curr, Jan King and Glenn Lewis. The Board secretary is Tony Arkell. Re-hired as auditors was the firm of Cooper, Millson and Foster, Toronto. The company was represented by chartered accountant Ed Bobot. The Ontario Agricultural Societies Convention is Feb. 18, 19 and 20 at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto.

Over 2,600 entries from 37 schools

MARKHAM — Thirty-seven schools placed 2,612 entries in the 1985 Markham Fair, committee chairman Linda Kruuk told the annual meeting, Jan. 15. This was an increase of 168 entries over 1984. Thanks to the backing of their "super art teacher", Mrs Lloyd, Whitchurch-Highlands repeated its success of the year before, Linda said. The top student was Shawna McGregor of Whitchurch-Highlands. A hand-drawn get-well card entered by Cindy Ogryzlo of Whitchurch-Highlands was Best of Show, Grades 5 to 8. Corrie and Justin Harding of Dickson's Hill School, entered the first prize scarecrow. The committee will change chairmen in '86, Linda said. Judy Gray will head up this section assisted by Barbara Patrick.

Heavy horse class may take two days

MARKHAM — A two-day show for heavy horses at Markham Fair? It's a possibility. Steve Lewis, committee chairman, says last year's experience proves a change is necessary—either extend the competition into the night-time hours or divide it over two days. He favors the latter. Steve says the show is too large to complete before night-fall, even utilizing a two-judge system. He fears entries will drop off if competition goes too late. However, a two-day show presents problems also. More stabling will be required, he explains. In a report to the annual meeting, Jan. 15, Steve describes the Markham Fair Draft Horse Show as "the most respected in Ontario."

A.T.V. Show Great success

MARKHAM — Despite the fact it ran competition with the Tommy Hunter Show, the All Terrain Vehicle Pull at Markham Fair last year proved a tremendous success. Steve Grove, the committee chairman, reported more than 60 entries, three times the number expected. This interest, plus a huge crowd made for a great evening, he told the Fair's annual meeting, Jan. 15. He said the event was planned only a few weeks prior to Fair time, but ran smoothly. Some of the competitors came from as far distant as sixty miles, the chairman said. The committee is anxious to make it an annual event. "It's the kind of thing that keeps families coming to the Fair," Steve said. They want to see what new "Legs" will be out there this summer next year, he suggested. "I don't want to overpromise."
