

Police cruisers to contain guns

DURHAM REGION — Durham Regional Police will soon equip all the force's marked cruisers with 12-gauge shotguns. Chief Jon Jenkins said the weapons will provide better protection and give officers a "psycholgical edge" in potentially dangerous situations.

The decision was based on recommendations made by a committee of senior police officers and representatives of the Durham Region Police Association (DRPA). They studied the proposal in 1985.

The pump guns, costing \$525 each, will be installed in police cars beginning next month. Officers will first have to complete an intensive training session to become familiar with the new weapons.

The 400-member force is the first major police department in central Ontario to arm all marked cars in this way. The shotguns will be placed in special vertical mounts ahead

of the front seat of a cruiser. The push for these guns geared up after the high number of police killings in 1984, according to Constable Terry Delves, a director and member of the DRPA's equipment committee.

Although no Durham Region officer has ever been killed in the line of duty, one did have a close call in a shootout with bank robbers last March.
