 The Grade 6 student at Goodwood Public School will play the lead role in the musical, "Davey Crockett", to be staged April 17 and 18. She's thrilled.  
 "I really wanted this part," she said in an interview, Thursday. "I enjoy singing, particularly solos."  
 Although the two-night performance is still more than two months away, rehearsals are in full swing. So is the costume-making.  
 Co-ordinating the program are staff teachers Lori Briggs and Fran DeMarco.  
 Angela has never had vocal training. Some day, she says, she'd like to take lessons so her voice will improve. Right now, it's just fun.  
 Angela's in the process of memorizing her lines. The part is included in a "Davey Crockett" folder that she takes home every night. She also listens to music on tape.  
 Does playing to an audience make you nervous? she was asked.  
 "Not once I'm on stage," Angela says. She claims the presence of her sister, (Kim), and her parents, (Lloyd and Charlotte), in the auditorium strengthen her

confidence. "I feel better when my mother and dad are out there," she says.  
 Measurements for her costume are complete. Gigi Fisher and a committee of parents have volunteered their talents.  
 While singing is a priority interest, Angela enjoys other activities as well including—water skiing, downhill skiing, volleyball and reading.  
 But all these are of secondary importance when Goodwood becomes Hollywood and the spotlight shines on Angela Gayman. "It'll be the highlight of my six years at school," she says.
