Just Between Friends: A slick dramatic comedy

JUST BETWEEN FRIENDS: It should probably come as no surprise that slick dramatic comedy moves along with the pacing and pat conclusions of a highly-tuned sitcom.

After all, it was produced by MTM Enterprises, the studio behind such TV hits as *Newhart*, *WKRP* in Cincinnati and *Rhoda*.

But what is quite surprising here is the film's plot, which unfolds like a series of well-timed explosions. It concerns the complications that arise when a housewife (Mary Tyler Moore — the founder of MTM) unknowingly befriends the mistress (Christine Lahti) of her husband (Ted Danson).

To say much more about the surprising events that arise from this pointed triangle would probably steal half the fun in a film too cute to be taken seriously but amusing enough to be entertaining. It's enough to say that the plot unfolds in directions that, while not unexpected, are progressively more outlandish.

The dramatic centre of *Just Between Friends* is the relationship between Moore's naive character and Lahti's more worldly character. But it's a core that only works to a point because of the simplistic shading of Moore's character.

Indeed, writer-director Alan Burns (co-creator of the *Mary Tyler Moore Show* and one of its spinoffs, *Lou Grant*), has an occasional weakness for peddling clichés where characters would do. And while he has a genuinely amusing ear for dialogue, he sometimes inserts jokes in the most tragic moments of the film.

At least his film has two adroit performances from Sam Waterston as Danson's nervous buddy and Danson himself, who plays a rat, but one with two sides that we see. (AA) ★★

This majestic epic from director Sydney (Tootsie) Pollack moves slowly at times but it's an intriguing drama where length means depth instead of tedium. (PG) ★★★
