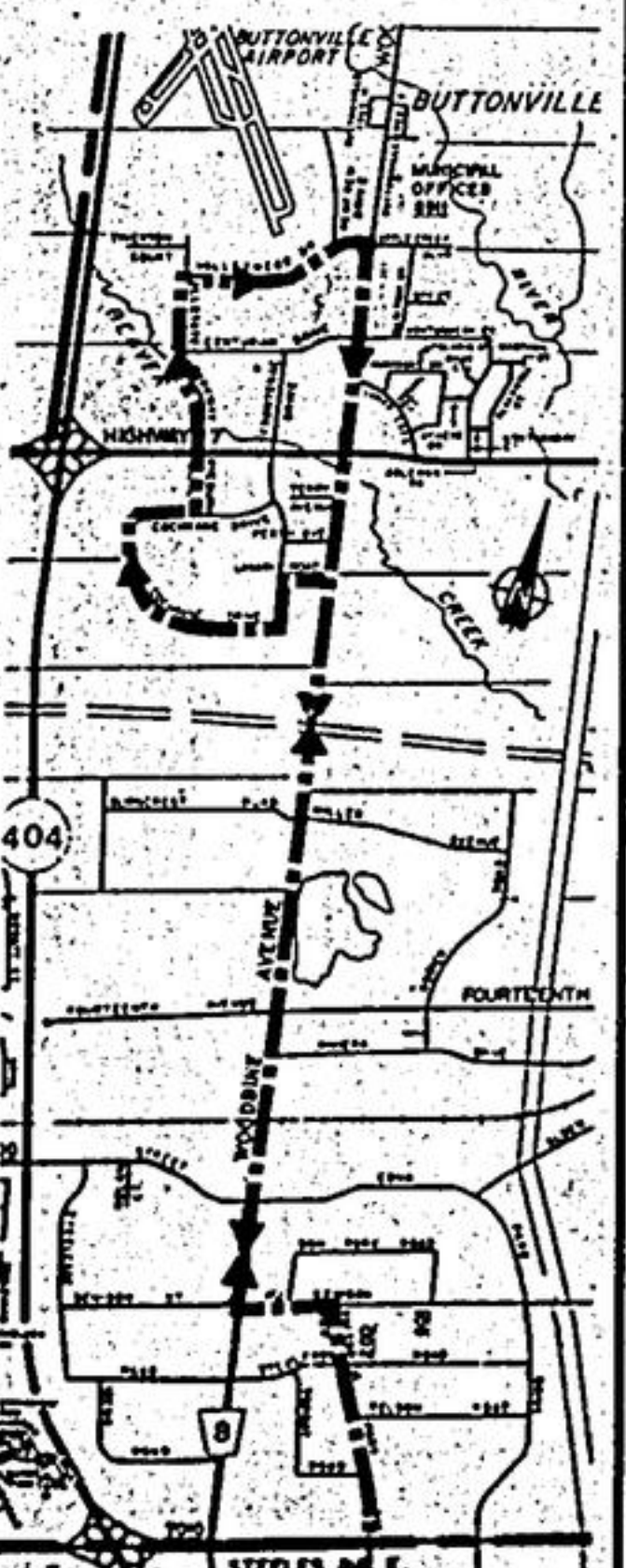
GIRLS' HOCKEY FINALS

However, industrious coaching on the Amherstburg bench effectively quashed Stouffville's offence. Jason Underwood and Scott McKinley—the nucleus of the Clipper attack—were vigorously lassoed in the next three contests.
Amherstburg won the second encounter 3-2, scored four goals in six minutes in game three to secure a 7-2 victory and three markers in the third period of game four to win the championship 7-4.
Heather Campbell whose son Jamie plays on the pee wee squad, said Amherstburg was the first real competition for Stouffville all season.
"We won three tournaments this season, but the opposition in those events usually played us only once," she noted.

Life after midget hockey?

"Not many boys even tried out for the midget Clippers this past season. We only had one regular goalie."
Fockler recalled two local athletes in the 1960s who were homesick on their out-of-town junior clubs and came back.
"They move into a whole new surrounding. They have to watch what boys they're mixing with," explained the coach. It can be a socially tumultuous time for a lot of young men.
Having no where else to go, the patriotism to a town league that stops short at midget isn't as strong as it could be, figured Fockler.
"If the kids had something to shoot for, they'd work a little harder," he quipped.
For now, a few select players like Christensen and Beam and the already departed Mike Feasby (he plays for the Markham junior A Waxers) just go elsewhere. But they represent a small minor-ity, qualified minor hockey league president Dave Bourne.
"Alarmist cries of a mass exodus of elite local talent to other communities is grossly over-stated; he challenged.
"In the last 10 years we've only lost five or six players to junior clubs," he noted.
Even if Stouffville had a junior C team, there's no guarantee that resident players like Christensen—who are A-calibre material—are going to stick around.
