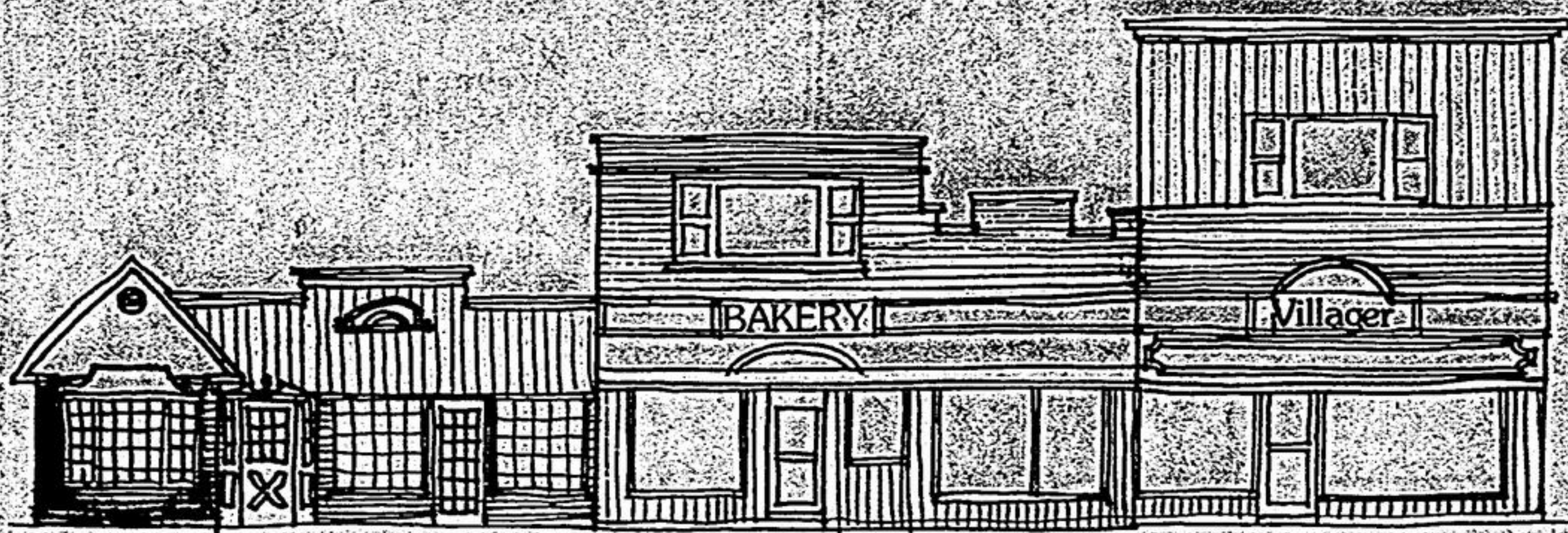


# New look on Main Street

## 'Alcohol the most dangerous drug'

STOUFFVILLE — "Alcohol is the most dangerous drug of all," Jim Demers told an assembly of Grade 6 students at Summitview School, Thursday.

Mr Demers headed up a Youth Alcohol and Drug Awareness

workshop at Summitview, Orchard Park and other schools in York Region. The program extended over a period of six days.

The speaker shocked his young audience, (and some of their parents), when he told of known alco-

holics in York Region as young as Grade 8.

"Grade 11 and 12 students use alcohol a lot," he said, "with Grade 12's the worst." Drug use is highest in Grades 9 and 10.

When tempted to use alcohol or drugs, Demers urged his listeners to say "no".

"Buy a T-shirt that says 'I don't drink' on the front and 'I don't smoke' on the back and keep turning around and around."

Demers touched on the various forms of drug use from inhalants through to heroin. Marijuana, he said, has been around since green things first grew on this planet.

"There are those who claim it's not harmful, but that's a lie," he stated firmly. He outlined the damage it can do to young men and young women.

Demers urged his audience to "spread the word." "Be there when others want more information," he concluded.

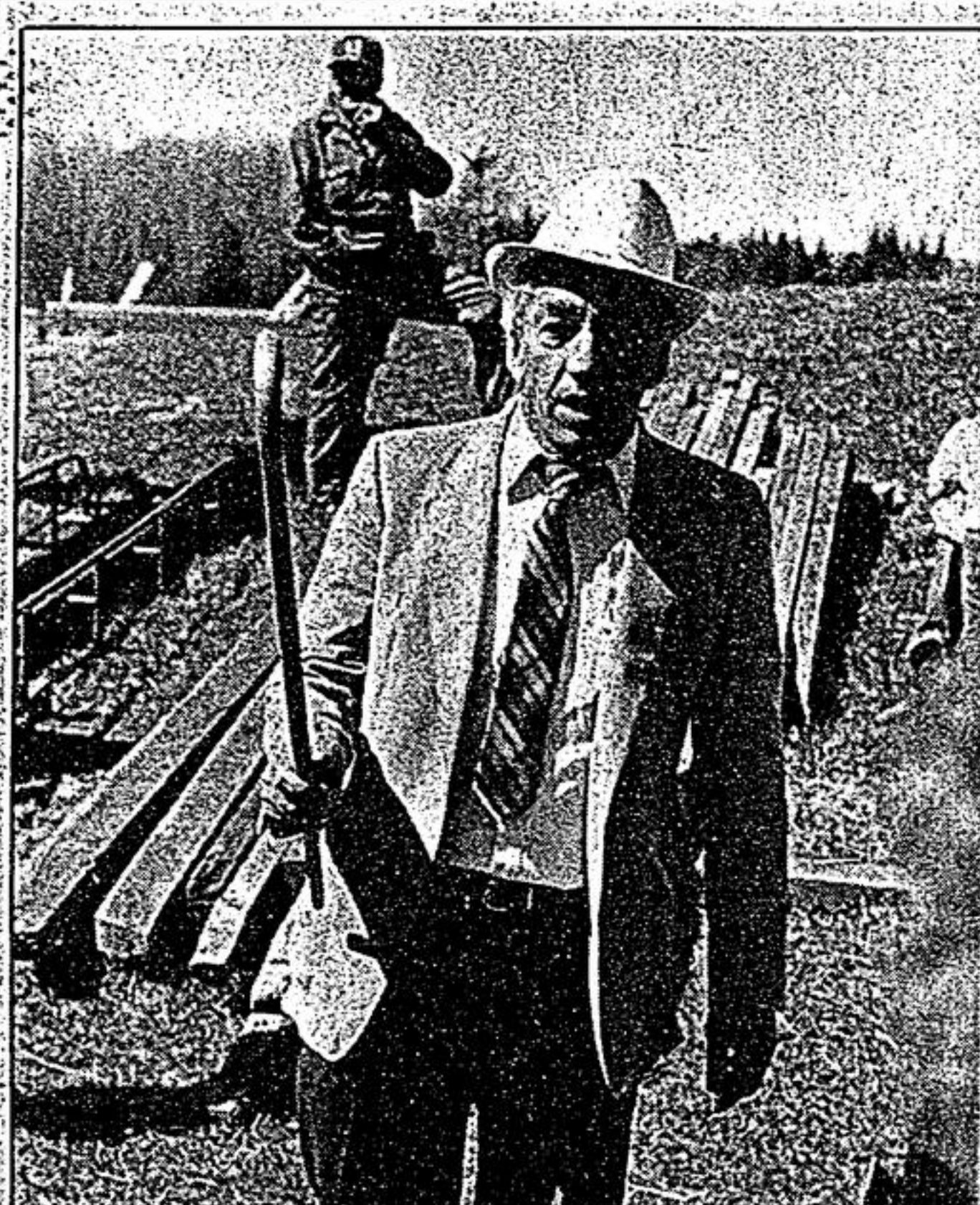
### Guest family

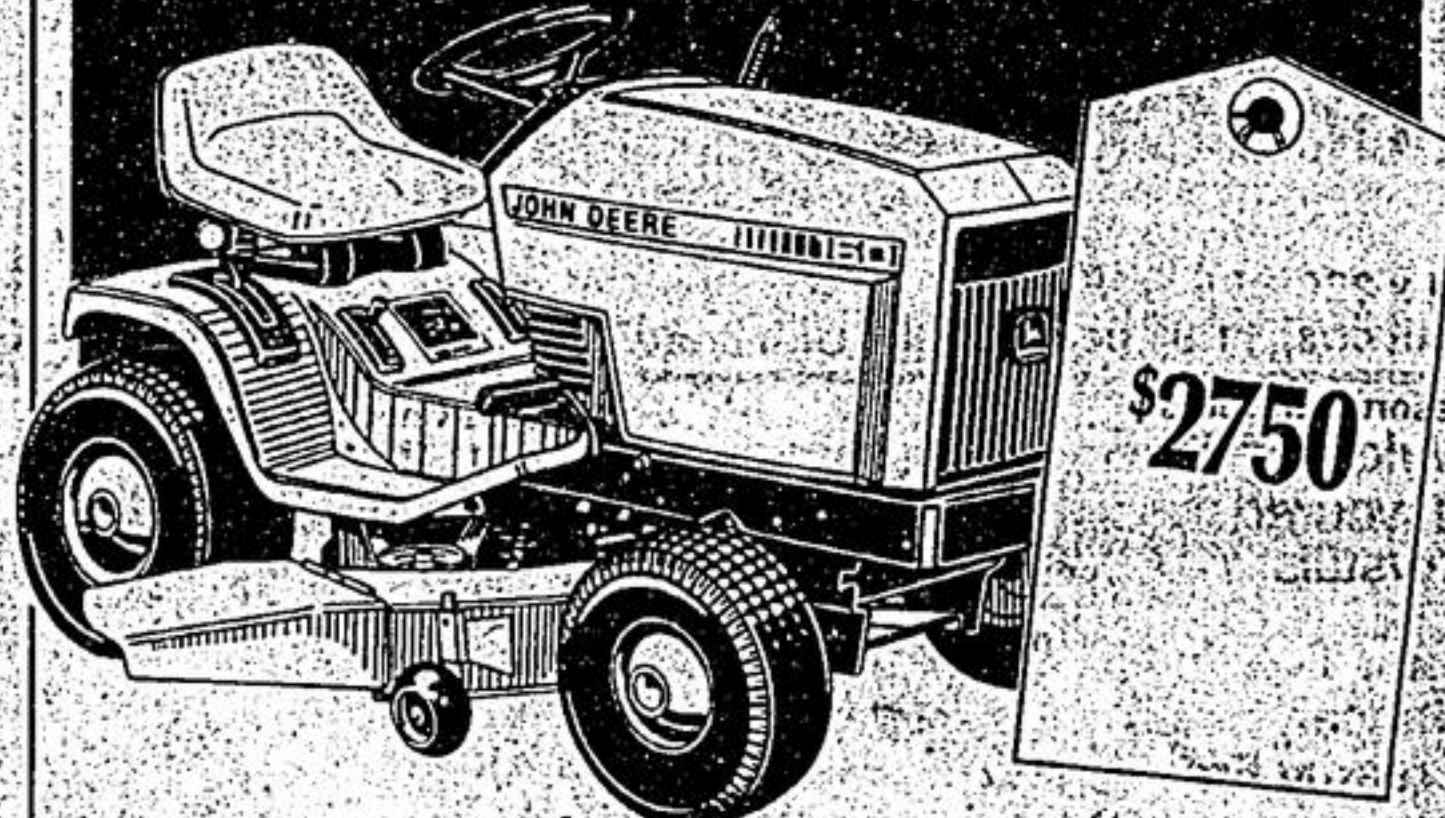


### Auction fever returns

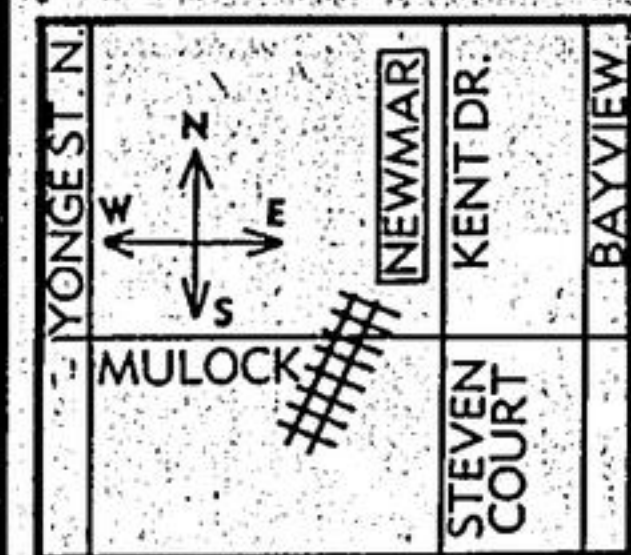

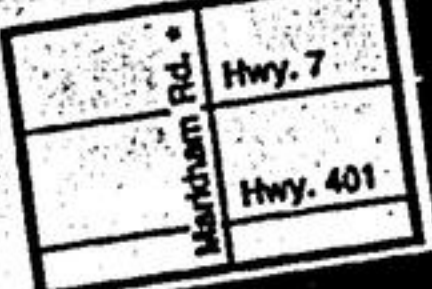
