

Police await autopsy report on Stouffville man's death

STOUFFVILLE — York Regional Police continue to investigate the apparent suicide of a 21-year-old Stouffville man on Sunday.

"No foul play is expected but we have to check out all the angles," Sergeant Frank Laskoski told The Tribune Monday.

Investigators are awaiting the

results of an autopsy.

A passerby discovered the man at about 11:55 a.m., staggering near the Bethesda Sideroad, between Hwy. 48 and the 9th Line.

He died early Monday after being rushed to Wellesley Hospital, with second and third-degree burns over his entire body.

He had attended church in Stouffville earlier that morning.

Police found a gas can and book of matches nearby and believe gas was involved in the incident.

A funeral service will be held today (April 30) at 2 p.m. in Stouffville Pentecostal Church.

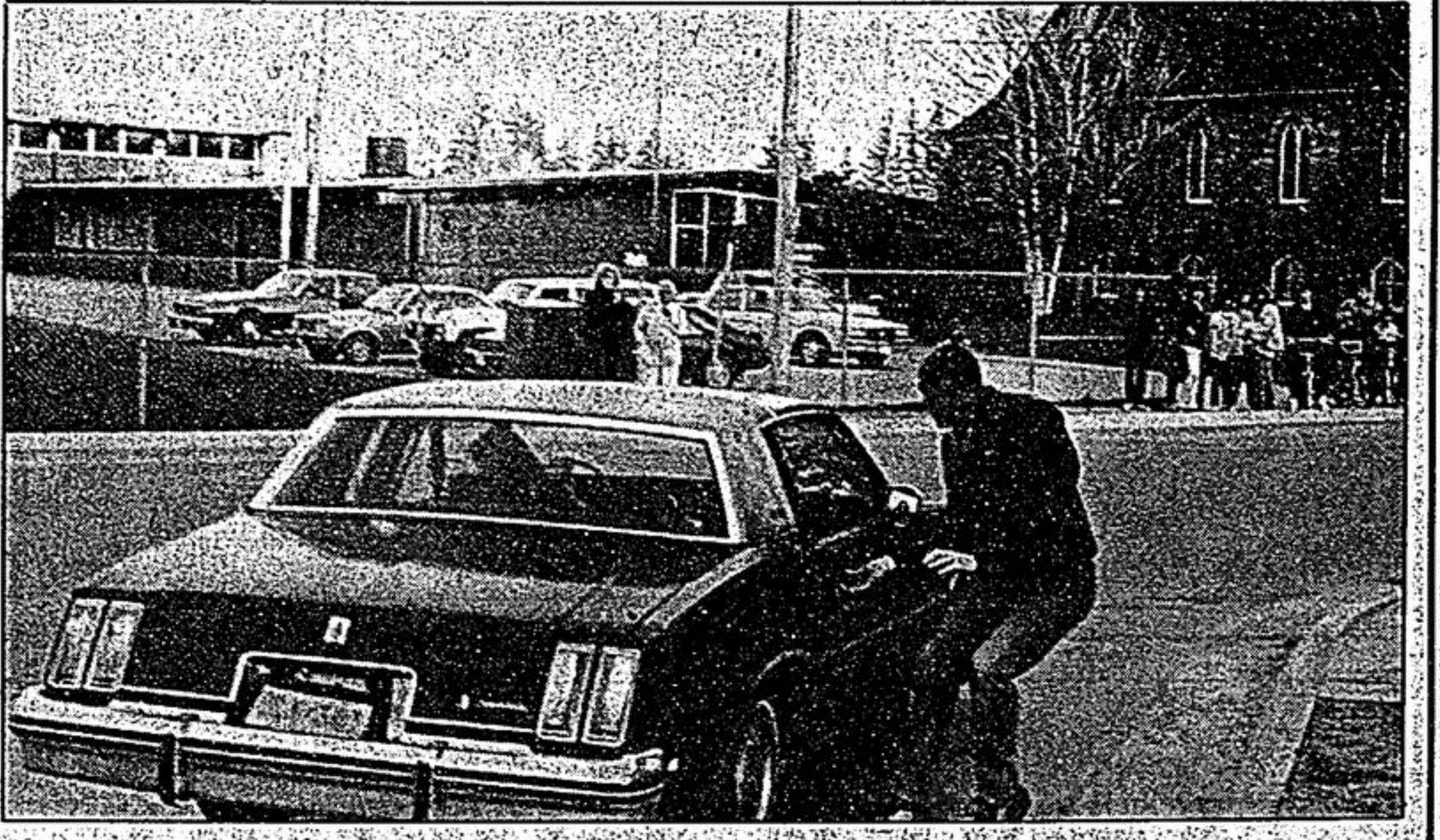


Crime Stoppers re-enacts Uxbridge abduction

Grants plentiful in riding

In this news column, I would like to discuss recent government grants that have been awarded to several areas within the riding of Durham York. This is the first in a two-part series on such grants.

Uxbridge Public Library received \$492,500 for an addition to its historic building. A grant of \$40,000 was previously given to the township toward conservation of the structure.

Also, Holland Landing Library received a Wintario grant to go

along with the \$156,733.84 received for the community centre section of the same building.

Georgina Township Public Library has been granted \$20,000 for the purchase of library furniture, a computer, software and a film screen.

Since 1981, when I was first elected, Wintario funding has been awarded to new libraries in Port Perry and Keswick. And Ontario Neighborhood Improvement Programs (ONIP) have provided money for renovations to the Sutton Library.

The Chippewas of Georgina Island have received two grants from the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture. The Ministry contributed \$12,672 to enable two native students to attend a skills training course at Sir Sandford Fleming College. And the Ontario Native Economic Support Program has allotted \$250,000 for the construction of a Virginia Beach Marina.

These are just a few of the valuable projects that have recently received funding. In my next news column, I will discuss grants for other programs.
