


# Business Beat

## Uxbridge man markets distiller

Tap water in Whitchurch-Stouffville and surrounding communities isn't safe to drink until it's been purified, claims the distributor of a new distilling device.

"I think the water everywhere in southern Ontario is not safe to drink but for Stouffville in particular, I've talked to some people who have told me stories you wouldn't believe," said Uxbridge Township's David Robertson.

And he added many of these so-called horror stories — including some that blame "hard" municipal water for causing bodily joints to become painfully stiff — have been substantiated by comparison tests conducted by himself and others.

Mr. Robertson recently began marketing a home water distiller that he feels will help solve the problem.

"It's as pure (approximately 96 per cent) as you can get," he explained of water treated by the

CWA unit, which closely resembles a stainless steel coffee urn.

It can produce about a half gallon of distilled water per hour while using \$2 worth of electricity over a 24-hour period, according to the distributor. This boils down to about 25 cents a gallon, considerably less than the retail price of distilled water.

The product — developed and manufactured by Downsville's Water Distillers Inc. — uses a process of condensation to remove unwanted contaminants and gases from normal tap water.

Mr. Robertson's first contact with a distiller came about three years ago when, as Pickering resident, he discovered assorted impurities in his family's drinking water.

"I looked into the different types of water purification and I found that distilling produced the purest form of water," he recalled.

The businessman claimed the process has proven effective in the removal of a long list of pollutants, including radioactive particles.

Mr. Robertson, who works full-time in the computer field, admits the \$499 CWA device hasn't yet attracted the local interest he anticipated.

But he's confident public education will make a big difference in his part-time business, which was partly inspired by water concerns stemming from the now-closed Hwy. 48 landfill site.

A provincial study is now determining the long-term health effects of toxic substances originating from that garbage dump.

"I believe that in 10 years from now public awareness will be great enough that everyone will be purifying their water in one form or another," Mr. Robertson said, adding that health benefits are a major plus.

"I have no evidence that I'm any healthier, but I feel better," noted the 31-year-old father of two. "It's not just the immediate benefits (of distilling water), but the long-term benefits as well."
