Mrs. Lennie said merchants have all kicked in to make the event a success and added that it's sure to be a hit.

"I think it's going to be a fun evening for all," she said. "It's something a little different as far as most midnight madness sales go."

Local and not-so-local personalities will be on hand to judge a dance contest and inflated prices for hot dogs will actually drop as the night wears on. Prices for these delicacies will begin at 99 cents and drop to 15.

merchants will give visitors a taste of summer. Mrs. Lennie noted that there will also be free draws all evening for prizes.

The dance contest begins at 10 p.m. and runs until 11:30 p.m. Judges include Markham Councillors Gord Landon and Tom Newall, CFTR-Toronto radio deejay Mike Cooper and CFTO-TV reporter Glenn Cochrane.

Dance-offs will be held in each heat until five finalist couples compete for a grand prize trip to New York City.

"It's really going to be a great event with the beach party atmosphere," said Mrs. Lennie. "We've been working on it for awhile."

While entertaining guests, merchants will also be raising and contributing money to Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children.

"Everyone is looking forward to it — we hope to make it an annual event," she said.

Markham Festival dance to have pop video

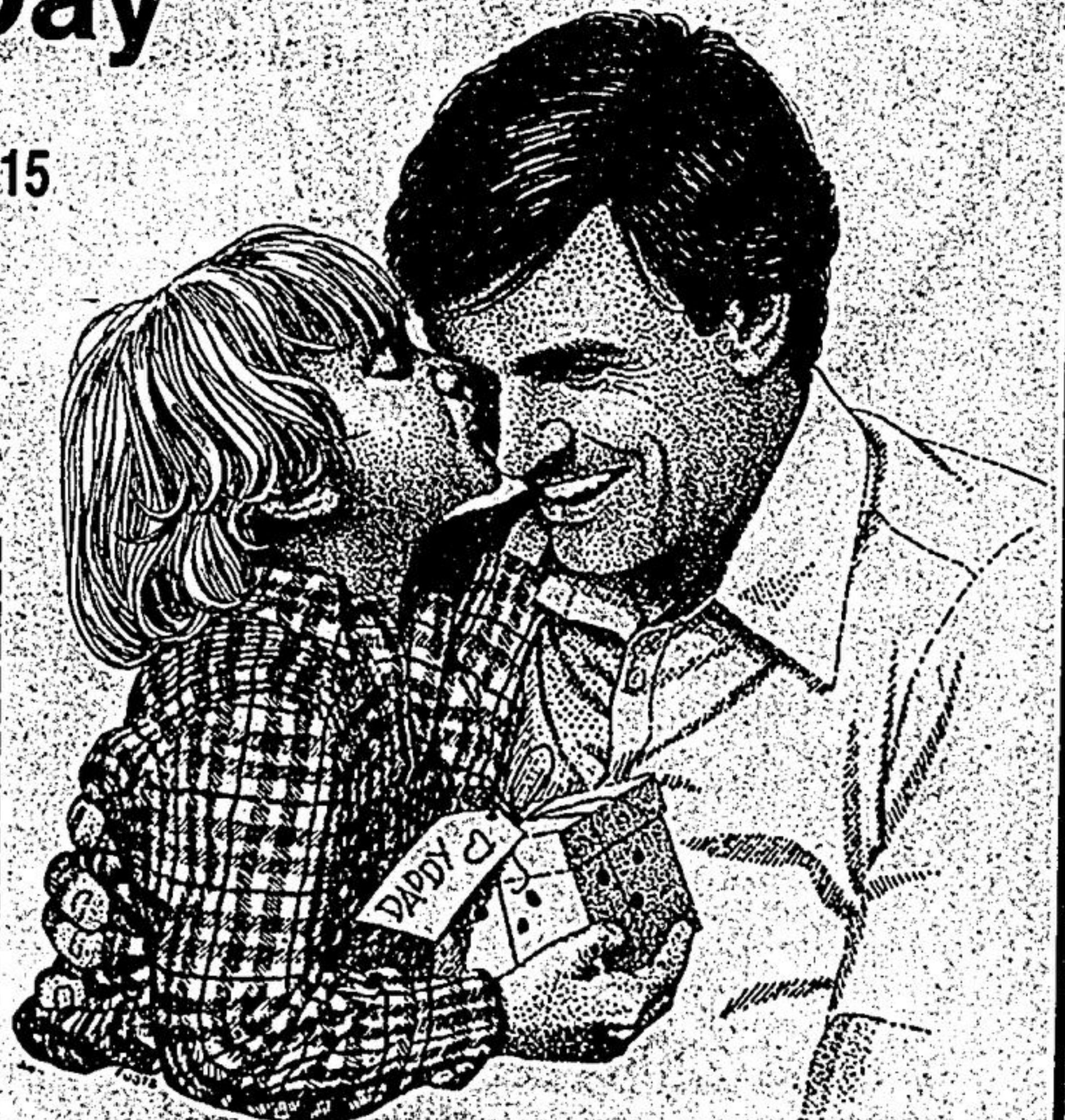
