Arts 'celebration' finale on Sunday

The final send-off of the Celebration of the Arts takes place tomorrow with special events for the whole family.

Included in the roster are the Ontario Rhythm Cloggers and an 18th century dance workshop.

The gala arts festival has been a four-Sunday series of performances and displays by a variety of artists. Tomorrow's proceedings take place on the grounds of the Markham Theatre, or, in inclement weather, inside Unionville High School, adjacent to the theatre.

On the indoor stage performances scheduled are ConfiDance (modern dance), Markham Men of Harmony (men's chorus), the rhythm cloggers and Pegasus Repertory Theatre.

The outdoor stage will host Tapistry (tap dance), Jonas Pennell (poetry), Darlene Salomaa (folk and children's music), Danse Baroque (18th century dance workshop), Markham Concert Band and Thornhill Swing Band.

Other events include performances by Richmond Hill Curtain Club and Markham Little Theatre, the Cloud 9 Clown Band,

The Caterpillar and the Canada Goose of Circus Bazar and Sumi-e workshop by Janet Iwaszczerko.

The festival runs from noon to 5 p.m. with events taking place all afternoon.
