

## Late Howard Mashinter Front yard fall leads to death

STOUFFVILLE — A fall from a ladder two weeks previous resulted in injuries and complications that led to the death of Howard Mashinter, Main Street West, Stouffville.

Mr Mashinter suffered a fractured pelvis and several broken ribs. Although fully conscious when admitted to Scarborough Centenary Hospital, pneumonia set in. He passed away July 13. Mr Mashinter was 81.

Born at Weston, the son of Lawrence and Elizabeth Mashinter, Mr Mashinter was a co-owner in the firm of L & M Lumber at Leaside. He later purchased a hobby farm at Milliken where he marketed fruit and vegetables.

Howard and Edna Mashinter enjoyed their winter holidays in Florida, a vacation spot for the past 16 years. Shuffleboard was a favorite sport.

Here in Stouffville, he received much satisfaction from caring for his lawn and garden. He gained many friends through association with the Silver Jubilee Club.

Mr Mashinter was identified with Stouffville United Church.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three sons, Earl of Unionville; Don near Lindsay and Ted of Markham; three stepsons, Morley of Agincourt; Harvey of Mississauga and Bruce of Collingwood; one stepdaughter, Muriel (Mrs Peter Ganny) of Toronto; a sister, Alice Mattison of Weston; 19 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

He was predeceased by his first wife, Nellie (Helm), and a son Douglas.

The O'Neill Funeral Home was filled for the service, Wednesday, conducted by Rev. Cecil Tiller, with interment Churchill Cemetery. Pallbearers were—Morley, Harvey and Bruce Loveless; Rick Stem, Richard Ehlund and Richard Huke.

## Discuss hamlet's growth

BLOOMINGTON — If development within the hamlet of Bloomington proceeds according to plan, the community will boast 162 homes and a population of 550 people.

A third public meeting to discuss the future of the area will be held Aug. 5 at 7:30 p.m., in Latcham Hall.

If approved, expansion will occur to the north-west, (Popovich); north-east, (Fisco) and south-east, (Schivelli and Sabiston). An application is also pending on lands to the south-west but no definite word has been received on this. Town Planner Michael Saunders told The Tribune.

Reason for a third meeting, Mr Saunders explained, is to provide residents with additional information on services, (wells), and lot sizes.

The Ministry of the Environment has recommended wells be no less than 30 meters deep and lots be not under 4,000 square meters, (one acre).

A hydrologist who helped prepare the Ministry report, will attend the Aug. 5 discussion.

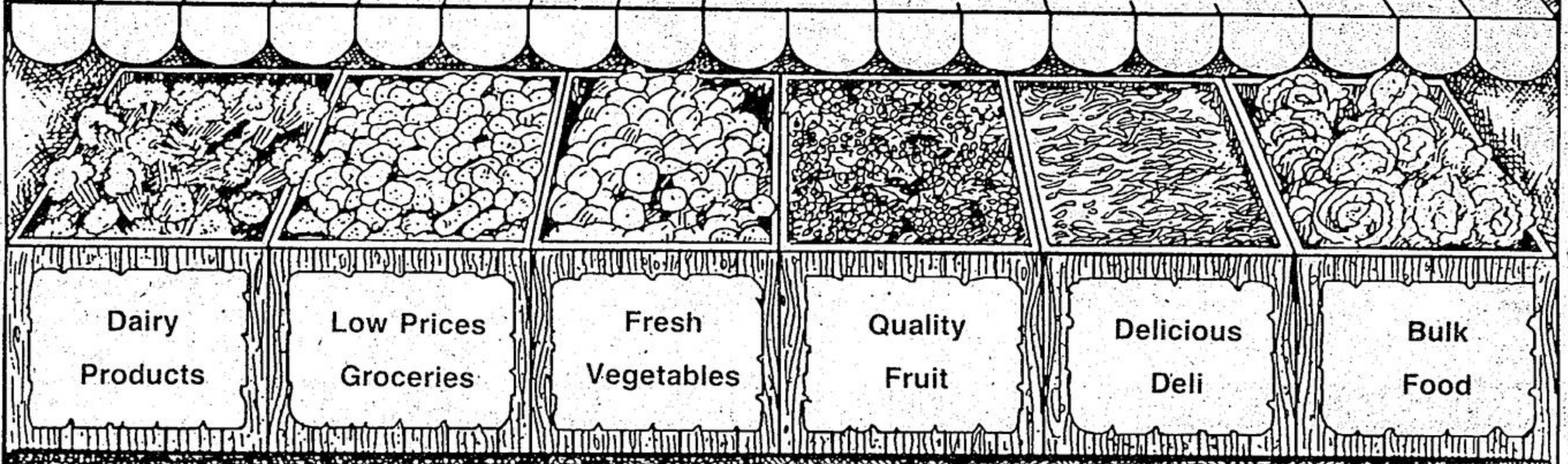
Mr Saunders said the anticipated total population of 550 includes sixty residents of Green Gables Manor.
