"We want to help these young people to become productive citizens," Sally-Ann told The Tribune. She said no matter how well-meaning their motives, many are totally unprepared for independent living and simply can't cope. "We try and minimize.

A main purpose of Youthdale LAUNCH is to help young people Some are successful. Some reach solutions to their problems, such as budgeting, housing and Some are working; some are in employment. Where necessary, LAUNCH will facilitate a link-up with other pertenent services in the area, (e.g.), Youth Employment Services. The organization assists young people in establishing and fulfilling goals by helping them determine their own strengths and weaknesses.

In many instances, Sally-Ann said, it helps a young person if he or she can discuss his/her problems with others in similar circumstances. Peer support groups as well as individual counselling is also provided.

The program, introduced in York Region in May, is designed to benefit young people already living on their own in the community.

The LAUNCH program is located at 85 Eagle Street in Newmarket. However, the staff is mobile throughout York Region.

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
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
