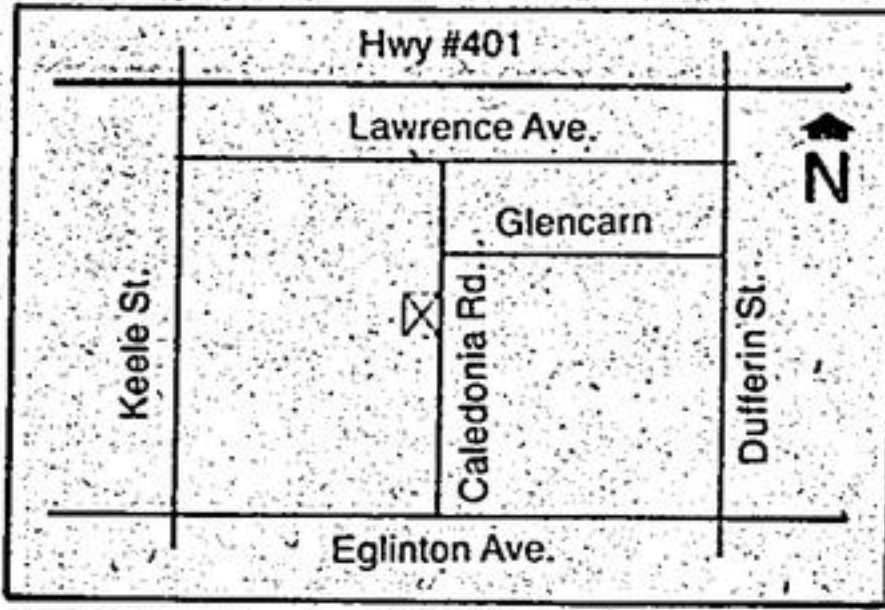

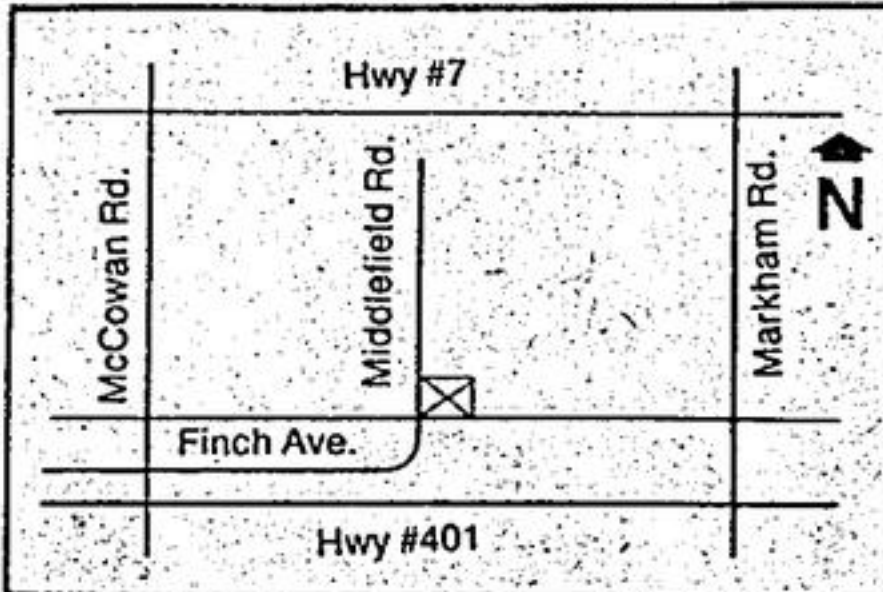

**Police promoting
crime prevention**

York Regional Police Force's Community Services Bureau is circulating crimeproofing information packages to all merchants in the region.

The kit includes robbery-prevention materials to assist local stores and businesses in avoiding theft. It also provides information on what to do in the event a crime is committed.

Constable Robert Bolam of the Bureau delivers and explains procedures to merchants in the Stouffville area while fellow officers cover other municipalities.

"We've had a very good response from the merchants," he said, noting this is the first time such a program has been tried in York Region. "They are willing to stop and listen to the information."

According to a brochure accom-

panying the crimeproofing kit, the police "need your help so they, in turn, can help you in crimeproofing yourself and your community."

"The new Chief of Police, Donald Hillock, is a very public relations-oriented man," said Cst. Bolam. "This program lets the public know we care."
