Local singer shows promise in concert

He has all the qualities to be successful. He's energetic, he performs well in front of an audience, and most of all he's talented.

It sounds cliché but Mark

James Fortin is a diamond in the rough. If his show at the Markham Theatre last week was any indication, with the right exposure and proper guidance, he could quite possibly end up to be a local success story.

The show got off to a slow start when the band's opening song blew a circuit breaker. But Fortin controlled the situation by joking with the audience and performing two numbers with his acoustic guitar.

After the problems were cleared up, it continued as a very professional show.

Fortin has obviously been influenced by musician John Cougar Mellencamp. His style is comparable, even his own material had certain similarities.

His voice, which strongly resembles Neil Diamond, was powerful. This is a man who doesn't need a band to sound good.

Yet Fortin's five-man band gave the show that added bit of energy that simply could not be accomplished with one man and an acoustic guitar.

The effects were complementing without being too flashy, so as not to take away from the music.

Unfortunately occasional blunders by Fortin's sound crew were a distraction.

Fortin frequently performs alone and with his band in local bars, including Brodie's Bar and Grill in Unionville, which sponsored the event. If the chance ever comes around to see Fortin perform, take it. It should be enjoyable.

Terry Fox Run returns in '86

Uxbridge's Terry Fox Run will be revived this year after the 1985 event was cancelled due to lack of local organization.

Resident Maggie McIvor has stepped forward and is looking for other volunteers to help her run the 10-kilometre fundraising trek on Sunday, Sept. 14.

Annual Terry Fox Runs — co-sponsored by the Canadian Cancer Society, Fitness and Amateur Sport Canada and Four Seasons Hotels — will be held on that date in communities across the country.

Last year, 300,000 Canadians participated in the fifth annual

run to raise a record \$3.6 million for cancer research in the name of Terry Fox, the one-legged athlete who attempted to run across Canada.

The Vancouver native died of cancer before he could complete his courageous journey in support of the Canadian Cancer Society. A run was soon established in his name to maintain public interest in the young runner's Marathon of Hope.

Participants will be able to obtain 1986 pledge sheets in the near future.
