

Teachers say hello to York

New teachers in York Region's public schools should be raring to go after attending a teacher orientation day on Wednesday.

The event, planned for new teachers hired by the York Region Board of Education, was held Wednesday at Aurora High School.

This September, more than 250 teachers will begin in York Region with 69 having joined the staff during the last school year.

Bob McCulloch, assistant superintendent of human resources, was chairman for the day's program.

"Teaching in York Region is an exciting, dynamic career," he added. "We hope this day provided a strong start for our new teachers."

"The purpose of the day was to identify key elements in the system and to inform new teachers of the resources available," he said.

Those attending met the chairman of the school board, the director of education, superintendent of school operations, federation presidents and many others.

A major part of the program focused on the role of the consultants—the 25 specialists to assist teachers in subject and divisional areas ranging from primary to technical education.

An introduction was provided to the curriculum process, guidelines that are available in the region, board priorities, etc. Additional sessions allowed each teacher to select a subject area of particular interest.

The afternoon session outlined the supervisory process in York Region.

"Since the process is so important to this board, we discussed the five supervisory steps and the new teachers met the assistant superintendents who will visit them in their classrooms," explained Mr. McCulloch.
