Accident prompts call for belt law

By CHRIS SHANAHAN UXBRIDGE TWP .- Calls for the mandatory use of seatbelts in

school buses were quick to follow an Aug. 28 crash that sent 23 children to hospital.

A seatbelt campaign intensified at Uxbridge Cottage Hospital soon after medical staff there had finished treating the injured passengers.

They were among 50 people on a Charterways school bus that

collided with a dump truck on Brock road near the entrance to Uxbridge's Pleasure Valley recreation park.

Hospital administrator Rene Krizanc said medical staff came to the conclusion that most, if not all the youngsters, would not have required treatment if they'd been strapped in the vehicle.

"Basically, they were just banged up from the impact," Mr. Krizanc said "Otherwise they wouldn't have been injured. They would have staved in their seats."

Uxbridge Chief of Staff Dr. Ian Taylor is heading up the hospital's campaign to push seatbelt legislation through at the government level.

The hospital's management committee has given its approval for the circulation of a letter supporting the proposal. The Uxbridge Cottage Hospital Board is forwarding copies to the Ministry of Transportation and Communications and to local elected

New freeway still favored as future trucking route

they recognize the furor caused by heavy truck traffic on Markham's Main Street, town councillors don't see McCowan Road as a suitable short-term solution to the problem.

To make matters worse, city of Scarborough planning staff have recommended a new site for the proposed East Metro Freeway (EMF) in Durham Region.

However, Markham representatives believe local pressure should still be put on the provincial government to have a portion of it built.

A poll of individual councillors revealed that all are opposed to Main Street as a thoroughfare fortrucks although they face constraints in solving the issue.

Regional Councillor Bud Bonner is on record as saying a portion of the EMF in Markham's eastern boundary should be pushed to relieve the Main Street problem.

However, he agreed it isn't an "if it's done the right way." issue that will be solved in the near future.

Council is bound by a provincial connecting link agreement that prohibits the town from banning going to take the longest to do." trucks from the main street because it is a provincial road.

Of the nine councillors reached, eight said a McCowan Road alternative for the traffic is unsuitable.

Councillor Gord Landon said

MARKHAM - Even though McCowan could be a short-term solution if widened and improved to accommodate the trucks. He believes the best long-term solution would be the EMF, a northsouth route that would connect with the proposed 407 highway.

> "We should look seriously at putting them (trucks) on 17th Avenue and bring them down McCowan as a short-term solution," said Councillor Landon. "Then we should push very hard to set aside land for an extension of the East Metro Freeway."

Councillor Fred Cox agreed that the use of 17th Avenue as an alternate route across the top of Markham would be viable though . he pointed out that McCowan road near 16th Avenue wouldn't carry the heavy trucks in its present

He too, said the EMF is the best long-term target for council to push for and speculated that action could be taken within a year

"In my view that's the best solution and the only solution that's really acceptable," said Councillor Cox. "Unfortunately, that's

In the meantime, at least one local haulage company will continue to use Main Street. Keith Wilson, a spokesman for

Stouffville's Don Anderson Haulage Ltd., said it is the most direct route for the estimated 40 runs a

day that take trucks into Milliken and Scarborough.

In his view, Hwy. 48 is the only acceptable route for his drivers. A 9th Line run would take them. through Box Grove and road improvements at McCowan Road and Steeles Avenue make manocuvring the big dumptrucks there a test.

"I can see that it has all been built up on Main Street," said Mr. Wilson. "With brakes squealing and all the starts and stops I can see (the merchants') point but I don't know what alternative we have."

Councillor Ron Moran said the only acceptable bypass route would be in Markham's eastern boundary, namely the EMF, while Milliken Councillor Alex Chiu concurred that a McCowan Road route isn't viable.

"People live there too," he pointed out.

Thornhill Councillors Bob Sherwood, Doreen Quirk and Mike Popovich say the issue won't be solved by moving the traffic west of Main Street.

Councillor Sherwood said the issue should have been taken to task by former town planners while Mrs. Quirk said rerouting traffic would take the problem "from one group of people and

give it to another." "McCowan Road would have made a very good route 10 years ago," said Councillor Popovich.

Water future is on line at meeting

BALLANTRAE - Residents are expected to come a step closer to solving Ballantrae's longrunning water pollution problems at a public meeting tonight (Sept.

"The whole idea is for the people to have a say because it's a very important decision," explained ward representative Ron

Following the meeting, homeowners will be asked to choose what they feel is the best available solution.

The options, according to councillor Robb, are a communal water system, individual replacement wells or neither.

Questionnaires, 250 of which were recently distributed in the Ballantrae area, can be returned. following the meeting or taken to the town municipal office.

The average cost of a deep drilled well has been placed at \$16,000, with the province paying 85 per cent.

A communal water system has been priced at more than \$3 million, 60 per cent of that being picked up by the province. York Region contributes 25 per cent and the municipality 15 per cent.
