

Redshaw signs with Western Michigan

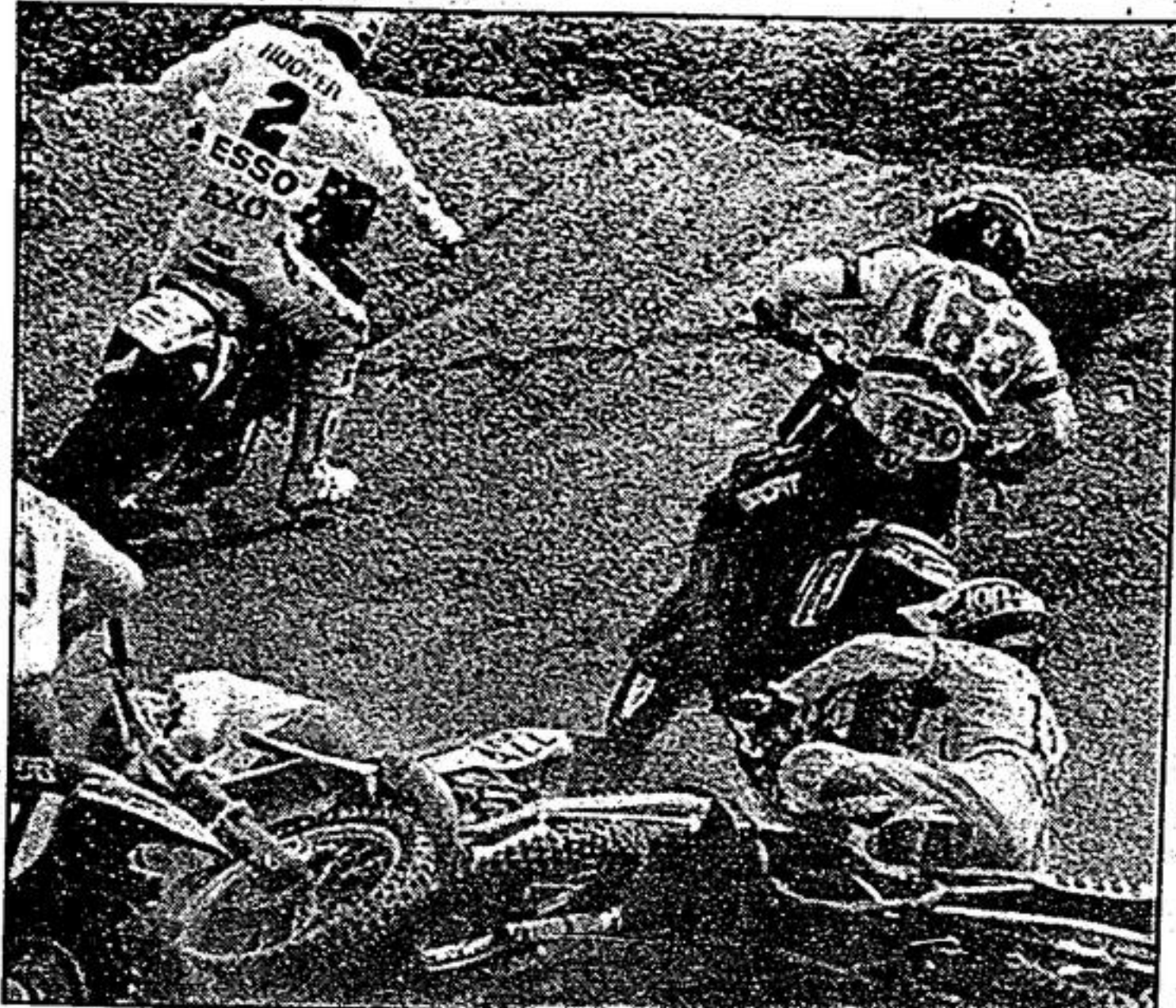

five," recalled proud papa Wayne Redshaw, a former Uxbridge Bruin coach. He called his son's new stomping grounds a "minor form of pro hockey" and the generous scholarships just part of a very competitive business. Because Canadian universities don't offer such grants, junior players with NHL potential look to the States as the place to be noticed by a pro scout. "I figure I'm pretty lucky and I hope this will all pay off in the end," said the budding hockey star from Goodwood. "We go to a tournament at Christmas where there will be all kinds of NHL scouts."

That event to take place at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit is called the Great Lakes Invitational. It's a three-day tourney and all the top teams from the States will be there. Redshaw hopes his parents will attend.

The deft shooter figures he has four years to make or break an NHL career. "There's a lot of pressure, but I'm just going to have fun and give 100 per cent all the time. It's hard to tell what's going to happen."

If Redshaw lives up to Western Michigan's expectations, his NHL debut on Showdown won't be his last.
