"I was a little disappointed," admitted McKenzie. "We'd get down inside Burlington's 30-yard line and our drives would stall, or we'd fumble."

Indeed, the locals gave up possession of the ball four times.

"We really need to re-group and get back together again. We're not as bad a team as our record (one win, three losses) shows."

Strong performances came from Cam Harden, Robert Gandhu, Greg Laycock, Toby McHale and Kurt Ianuzzo.

Bob Prefontaine's Atoms rebounded from a 42-0 drubbing at the hands of Burlington last week, and evened up their record at 2-2 with a 13-8 win over Brampton.

Doug Walton's 60-yard quarterback option run opened the scoring in the first quarter, with Wesley Matheson gaining the one-point convert dive.

Brampton replied with eight points, in the form of a touchdown and two-point conversion kick. But Tailback Chris Matheson galloped 15 yards to give the Raiders the winning major.

"The kids were really ready to play after that game last week," said Prefontaine. "We had an excellent week of practices. Myself and the other coaches feel we've turned the corner."

Ian Burrows was the defensive star, and Matheson took offensive honors. Other strong games came from Mike Croth and Doug Walton.


