Cousens' Corner

Last weekend over 1200 provincial Progressive Conservatives attended the Party's general meeting, the first one in several years.

There were three highlights that I would like to share with you...

The debate on free trade was of more than casual interest for me since I was the Moderator of the session and had to chair the session between Professor John Crispo of the University of Toronto and Mr. Clifford Pilkey, President of the Ontario Federation of Labour.

Few people had developed a position prior to the debate but there was little doubt that the majority of those present believed that Freer Trade with the United States will be a benefit to Ontario.

Professor Crispo pointed out how inconsistent it is for Bob White whose UAW has benefitted most from the Auto Pact is now crusading against freer trade... and also how biased the CBC and Toronto papers have been. Nonetheless the protectionism in the USA as a reaction to foreign trade might destroy the whole process for more open trade between Canada and the USA which in the long term would reduce Canada's and Ontario's opportunity to maintain the standard of living we have become accustomed to.

Our Federal Government also needs to make some commitments on how those Canadians who will be most negatively affected by freer trade and show them how they will be assisted.

The support being given to Mr. Grossman by all elements in the party through the campaign committee, the platform committee, the caucus and the party as a whole gave those present a tremendous sense of confidence for the future.

What was especially gratifying for me was to see the party renewing itself. The rivalries of the past leadership conventions have been set aside; the acceptance of the opportunity the party now has to provide responsible opposition yet building for the future was a sign that the party is alive and well, with a good sense of mission and purpose for the future.
