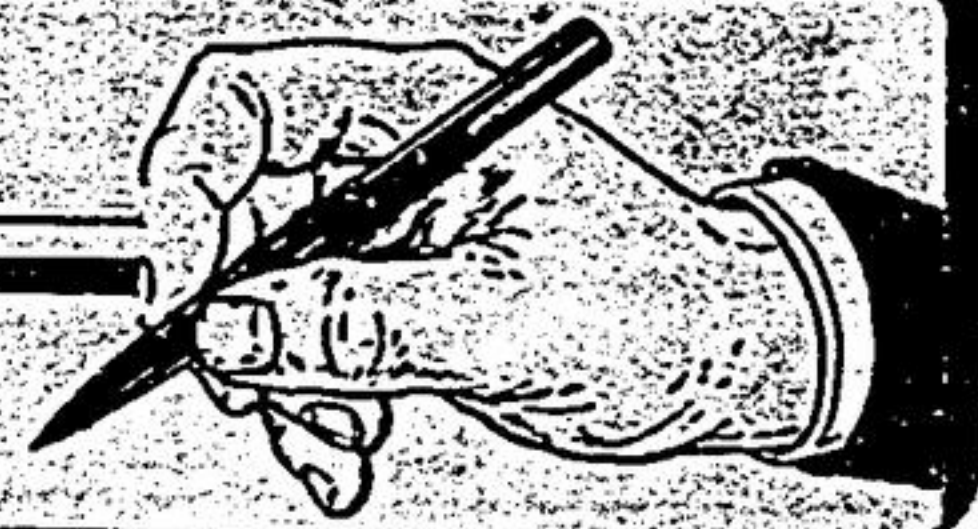

Street racing does exist in Markham — I have been involved in the past and know of people now using the roads as the only place that they can go to race.

This use of our public roadways puts everyone at a great risk to life and limb. The consequences of one wrong move can spell disaster.

It is only a matter of time until an incident will occur. We must solve this problem now. The competitive urge has been a part of mankind since the dawning of time.

Why else would we taxpayers be building all the hockey rinks, baseball diamonds, swimming pools and closing the roads to let people run?

Motorsports are the largest paid attendance sport in the USA. It is bigger than baseball, football, basketball and horse racing. There is a true interest in racing in our area.

The success of the Supercross at the fairgrounds, the tractor pulls, Canadian Champion motorcycle rider Paul McMillan, four time World Champion hill-climber and Markham Citizen of the year John Williams and his sons, Mike Weatherall on snowmobiles and the several people involved in the Players Challenge series.

These men, and many more I missed, travel thousands of miles each year and all call Markham home. They represent to the racing public a long list of accomplishments that are hard to achieve.
