

Crisis on Durham Board

Durham Board of Education's long-running accommodation problem is now reaching crisis proportions, according to a Board press release.

Early figures show that nearly 800 additional elementary students have enrolled in Durham schools for the 1986-87 term.

Areas hardest hit are Ajax with 550 new elementary pupils, Whitby at 295 and Pickering with 289.

While Uxbridge, Brock and Scugog enrolments have remained relatively static, Oshawa has experienced an overall decline.

At the secondary level, Ajax, Whitby and Pickering have undergone a combined increase of approximately 300 students compared to totals of a year ago.

As of Sept. 22, 1986, 63 new portables have been added to the system, while another 16 have been relocated to new sites. This brings to 258 the total number of portables used by the Board's schools.

"The Board continues to have the highest percentage of elementary students in portables of all public boards in Ontario," the release stated. "The Ministry of Education's policy of granting funds to the Durham Board of Education for the building of a maximum of two new schools each year does not keep pace with Durham's rapid growth rate and increasing enrolment figures. The accommodation crisis, particularly in the elementary schools affected by rapid new development, can only worsen if Durham does not receive additional schools at a much faster rate than is current practice.

Providing 'Quality Education Today — For Tomorrow' is a difficult, if not impossible task, if the Durham Board of Education cannot provide adequate classroom space and facilities for the teaching of students in its jurisdiction."

Charges finalized in bus accident

Criminal charges are expected to be officially laid this week against the drivers involved in an Aug. 28 school bus-truck crash that sent 23 Whitby students to hospital.

A Durham Regional Police spokesperson confirmed that charges have been finalized following a lengthy investigation involving the Crown Attorney's office.

Although all the details were not available at press time, sources said it's likely both the bus and truck drivers will face

separate careless driving offences.

Dozens of passengers suffered minor injuries when a Charterways bus loaded with children and camp counsellors collided with a dump truck on Brock Rd. near the entrance to Pleasure Valley park.

Nearly 50 members of the Whitby Youth Action group at St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church were on their way to a day-long outing at the Uxbridge Twp. facility when the accident occurred.


