Rainfall sets record

STOUFFVILLE — Oh, didn't it rain, and rain, and rain and rain! But how much?

Adam Johnstone of R.R. 21, Stouffville, keeps track of such things. He has a rain gauge in his backyard.

Believe it or not, (and Mr. Johnstone's rain gauge doesn't lie), 50.35 inches of the wet stuff fell from the heavens during the past twelve months. The period extends from October, 1985 through September, 1986.

That's more than four feet!

During the month of September alone, the rainfall measured 10.46 inches. In August, it was 8.65 inches.

This past summer was the wettest since 1928.

On a daily basis, it rained 4.20 inches, Sept. 11, and 3.10 inches, Aug. 16 and Aug. 27.

According to Mr. Johnstone, the average yearly rainfall in the Toronto area is 35 inches. We're well past that mark with three months still to go.

On a monthly basis, the John-

stone gauge records the following:

For 1985—October-3.03 inches; November-7.24 inches; December-1.75 inches.

For 1986—January-0.97 inches; February-0.75 inches; March-2.52 inches; April and May-4.41 inches; June-6.32 inches; July-4.25 inches; August-8.65 inches and September-10.46 inches.

This totals 50.35 inches or 1,354 millimeters.
