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Parkview Village complex official opening on Sunday

 STOUFFVILLE — The dream is now a reality.
 On Sunday at 2 p.m., Parkview Village, Ninth Line South, will be officially opened.
 The 124-unit seniors' complex, located on 16 acres of land and costing \$7,768,000, accommodates

175 people. It is modern and complete in every detail including a \$300,000 auditorium, the result of a private fund-raising drive.
 Sunday's ceremony, to which the public is invited, is the end result of a contract signed by Parkview's board of directors, Jan. 28, 1985. Construction commenced

two months later, and the first tenants began moving in April 22, 1986. By the end of June the building was filled with a waiting list for rooms.
 The executive administrator is J.M. Nighswander. The housing manager is Sheila Jones and the secretary-receptionist is Arlene

Raymer. Lorraine Steckley is the activity co-ordinator and Audrey Johnson, the craft room co-ordinator. Lorna Hogg is the supervisor of life enrichment services.
 The administrator of Parkview Home and Parkview Apartments, (Rupert Avenue), is Herb Diller.

While certain organized programs will be offered, Parkview Village endorses the desire for 'independent living' within the complex, Mrs. Jones explained.
 "The Residents still attend programs at the Silver Jubilee Club; do their own shopping and worship at the churches of their choice," she said.
 During the winter, services will be held Sunday evenings because walking and driving are sometimes difficult, Mrs. Jones stated.
 A Residents' Council will be established, she said.
 With administration approval, concerts can be held in the auditorium.
 To qualify for tenancy, a single applicant must be 60 years of age or over. With respect to couples, the husband or wife must be age sixty or more.
 A one-bedroom apartment rents for \$480; two-bedroom, \$595. There's an additional \$10 activity fee per person plus a \$12.50 parking charge were applicable.
 Several guests have been invited to participate in Sunday's ceremony including—York-Peel M.P. Sinclair Stevens; York-North M.P.P. Greg Sorbara; Regional Chairman Eldred King; Town Mayor Fran Sainsbury and members of Council; and Ken Holder, of Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The prayer of dedication will be delivered by Rev. Ed. Sparks, Parkview Home pastor.
 Music for the occasion will be provided by The Unity Singers.
 The keys to Parkview Village will be turned over by architect Gerry Musselman and builder Fred D'Silva to Mr. Nighswander and Mrs. Jones.
 The Master of Ceremonies is Glenn Steiner, Chairman of the Board.

Project
 With three projects now completed, Parkview's board of directors is considering yet one more.
 Twenty cluster units are planned for a part of the 16-acre site close to Ninth Line South. They would be served by a private entrance south of the home of Keith and Lorraine Steckley.
 While ownership would remain with Parkview, the purchase price has been placed at between \$63,000 and \$98,000. When a unit is no longer required, sale of it would be arranged.
 The clusters will be bungalow size, either one bedroom or two bedrooms and a den.
 The board is hopeful construction can begin this fall with completion by spring.
