CEDAR GROVE — The passing of Mrs Archie Little, Sept. 26, 1986, has been keenly felt in the Cedar Grove area and beyond. Mrs Little, the former Helen Freeman, was a life-long resident of the community.

Born on the family farm, Steeles Avenue, R.R. 1, Markham, she was the daughter of the late George M. and Nellie Freeman. As a young girl, she attended Box Grove Public School and later Markham High School and Toronto Teachers' College.

After obtaining her teacher's certificate, she returned to the neighborhood and taught for a period of eight years at Cedar Grove Public School. She was highly respected by parents and pupils alike.

Mrs Little's life touched all areas of the community. She was an active member in the congregation of Zion United Church, assisting in the Mission Band, the Women's Missionary Society and the U.C.W. She taught Sunday School many years.

She was a member in the ladies' section of the Unionville Jr. Farmers. Later, she assisted in the work of the Markham Historical Society and was a strong supporter of her husband in the work of the Jersey Club.

Mr and Mrs Little were married Sept. 21, 1935 and celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary just over one year ago.

Mrs Little suffered a stroke at home and passed away Sept. 26 in St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto.

She was extremely close to her family including Barry and Aileen; Robert and Carol; Carolyn and Don (Hoshel); grandchildren Douglas, David and Elaine; Kim, Kelly and Chris; Todd and Darren and great-granddaughter Heather.

Mrs Little has one sister, Ann Rowbotham of Cornwall.

Writes Mrs Morrison:

"We receive very little Canadian television news here and nothing from the Stouffville area. We are enjoying some wonderful experiences in the Middle East. Our sons visited with us during

the summer but they have since returned to Canada in order to attend school. We've been to two Arab homes for meals and one of our sons was introduced to a sheik. Riyadh is an interesting city. Parts of it are ultra-modern with some shopping malls that would put Markville to shame."


