

Markham Juniors, Seniors victorious

There's no doubt about it, Markham District High School (MDHS) Senior football coaches Myron Dnes and Ed Curry are a pair of smooth talkers.

The pair managed to come up with a convincing explanation to pass off the Marauders' surprising performance against King City on Thursday, a close 20-14 victory.

Markham's Junior Marauders had far less trouble, securing a first-place finish with a 15-6 victory over King City.

Meanwhile, keeping in mind the Seniors gave up only one point in six previous games, this tighter-than-tight struggle is almost akin to a major upset. But not so, say the skippers.

Indeed, King City showed it's for real on the gridiron patch. After organizing a pep rally beforehand and assembling a crowd of hundreds to watch, it ran up a 14-6 halftime lead.

Scott Hitchcock's 65-yard gallop put MDHS ahead early on (the convert was wide), but Greg Clark ran in to finish off a pair of long King City drives in the second quarter.

One reason is the recurring problem of complacency on Markham's part. It's resulted in players showing up late to practices, and Curry never having all his running backs together to go over plays. Hopefully this close call will change that.

Either way, the Marauders put their act together in the second half, gaining 128 yards to King's 30 and getting touchdowns from Scott Hitchcock and receiver Nick Mazzoli.

"We were able to adjust to King's offence, and I'm kinda proud of it," said Dnes. "A championship team can do that."

If the Seniors weren't up for the battle, Junior coach Jim George was worried that his troops might be too hyped up.

"I was very nervous because we were very high for this game. I told the boys I've never won at King as a football coach, so the boys said 'this will be your first.'"

Then they went out and did it, with Derek Couch kicking off for a single, and quarterback Chris Lamarre running in for a 15-yard major in the first quarter.

Lamarre and ace receiver Dan Tinkler teamed up for a 42-yard touchdown in the third quarter. King's only points were on a third-quarter TD.

Coach George was happy with the defensive play, particularly by Mike Lavary (who blocked two punts), Tom Walton and Brad May.

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
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Markham in playoff battle

was a third-quarter reverse that went 45 yards before Scott Crone was finally hauled down at Oshawa's 35-yard line. But the Raider offence could not gain any more ground.

Meanwhile Bob Prefontaine's Atoms managed to finish in third place with an even 4-4 record, after splitting their last two outings.

It was the Wesley Matheson show all the way against Brampton. He carried the ball for four touchdowns in a 26-6 victory.

Indeed, Matheson rushed for about 200 yards, thanks to two spectacular touchdown dashes. One was a 60-yard gallop in the first quarter, and the other a 90-yard race with less than a minute to go in the opening half.

The results weren't as good in Oshawa Wednesday night, where Matheson's five-yard TD run in the second quarter was all the Raiders could manage in an 18-6 loss.

"Except for their two long touchdown passes, we had the more productive offence," said coach Prefontaine. "Oshawa didn't get much yardage on the ground."

Markham was hampered with penalties that negated several long runs, and with not being able to play the game at a Markham field. (It was supposed to be a home game, but no fields here can be used now.)

Markham battles Oshawa again tomorrow, and Prefontaine is looking forward to the challenge. "They beat us Wednesday night, but we had a couple of key people missing," he pointed out.

Doug McKenzie's Bantam Raiders finished their season with an identical 4-4 defeat, only it was to Brampton. This loss was the story of turnovers: Markham coughed up the ball 11 times.

"It was a combination of good hits and a lack of concentration on our part," said the disappointed coach. "Can you believe 11 turnovers? It was a totally frustrating afternoon."

The Raiders' only score was a touchdown run by Jeff Johnson to tie the score 6-6 in the second quarter.

Markham reached Brampton's five-yard line near the end of the game, but a penalty pushed 'em back to the 15 and a fumble ended the threat.

"I don't think we played well as a team," assessed McKenzie. "The offensive line was moving guys out, but the backs weren't holding onto the ball. It was a total team breakdown."
