And when the two schools met,
it was Pickering who gained re-
venge for losses to Unionville in
two separate tournaments.

"My honest feeling is we played
fairly well," said Thomas about
the 2-0 final match count in Pick-
ering's favour.

"But I don't think anybody was
going to beat Pickering that day
(Tuesday)," he continued. "They
were awesome."

Unionville started well enough,
shutting out both Anderson
Coolegiate and Woodbridge High
School. But after that Pickering
loss, it was all downhill.

The Fletcher crew met them on
the way, and took a 15-10, 15-10
victory. It was the same score —
but in Pickering's favour — at the
ampionship.

"Pickering just played excel-
lent," Fletcher praised. "It was
their day, and we lost to a super
team." Peter Byer took his nod as
the best Spartan on the court that
day.

Stouffville ball league off the financial hook

The Whitchurch-Stouffville
Minor Softball Association
(WSMSA) will not receive a sub-
stantially-reduced town grant for
1987, as earlier feared.

The Town Recreation and
Cultural Services Committee
approved Tuesday a \$3,200 grant
for minor softball next season.
That last year's grant was \$3,500
did not concern WSMSA president
Eldon Wagg.

"The grant...for 1987 will be
equivalent to 1986," he assured,
once a few "grey areas are ironed
out."

"What it all boils down to is if we
feel we can do with less, we'll get
less." Eventually (1988 to be spe-
cific) Wagg would like the ball
club to be self-sufficient and not
have to rely on a town subsidy.

Last year there were about 700
kids playing ball in Whitchurch-
Stouffville. Wagg hopes that num-
ber will steadily increase as new

residential developments pop up
in the area.

Past president Marg Cosgrove,
who weeks earlier predicted the
demise of minor ball if the town
grant were cut considerably, was
a little less alarming when con-
tacted after Tuesday's approved
figure.

Her main concerns, she qual-
ified, are that the ball association
receive its "fair bit" to run prop-
erly and that the sport remain ac-
cessible to the children.

"We want to keep the registra-
tion fee down to a point where any
kid can play ball. We've always
made it accessible to the kids, but
if we were charging \$50, it
wouldn't be," she reasoned.

Last year's \$30 player fee might
see a "moderate" increase of \$5 to
\$7, noted Wagg. As well, the 10
new teams added to 1986's roster
may be joined by a couple more.

The WSMSA's projected budget
for '87 is approximately \$36,000,
up 10 percent from last season.

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
