The Raiders, under coach and Markham resident Mike Fitzpatrick, extended their winning streak to five with a pair of victories this past week.

Toronto's Brother Edmund Rice was a poor excuse for opposition, with the locals stomping their way to an 18-0 burial.

Paul Verkuyl and Unionville's Chris McKenna led the goal parade with four apiece. Joe Facchini had three and Unionville's Mark Mateer two.

Singles went to Andy Munuti, Unionville's Chris Cadorin & Kirk Bowen, Armando Baldassarra and Maurice Poirier.

Verkuyl and McKenna were shared the no. 3 high school star selection on CFTO-TV for their scoring exploits.

"Brother Rice shouldn't be in the league," said coach Fitzpatrick. "They dressed only eight players for the game."

Besides Cadorin, Mateer (both left wingers), Bowen (a defencemen) and McKenna (a right winger), the local contingent includes defencemen, team captain & Markham resident Tim Fielding plus centre/Unionville native Peter Bowen.

Mateer, Fielding and Victor F. De-Henostrosa supplied the offence in a 3-1 victory over Toronto's Senator O'Conner.

Fitzpatrick coached the Raiders to fifth place in their seven-team division of the Toronto District Catholic Athletic Association (TDCAA) league.

They compiled an 11-10-1 record and were eliminated in the playoff semi-finals. He attributes the strong start this year to experience.

"We have seven returnees from last year," Fitzpatrick pointed out. "And we're playing very well defensively. We've only given up five goals, which is pretty good for a high school team."
