

Midget Clipper veterans surprised at rookie talent

The Stouffville Midget Clippers have come a long way since the beginning of the season when a group of freshman—some house-leaguers and a few bantams—comprised 90 per cent of the roster.

With only four returning players from last year's midget club—Paul Sinclair, Blair Steel, Sean McQuigge and Jim Baggs—things looked pretty green for the Becker's boys.

Baggs, the team's 'king pin' on defence, is certainly impressed with how quickly the rookies have adjusted.

"We're working in the new players pretty good. They've all played up through the ranks in Stouffville and are quite apt to play in this league," he suggests.

This year's team may not be as big as last season's, but it has the speed up front and that's what counts, he adds.

The high-scoring 'Smink' line, with Sinclair flanked by former bantam sharp-shooters Kent and Kirk Smythe, has given the new midget club its much-needed fire power.

So far it's the only combination coach Ray Steel hasn't jiggled. Russ King has been re-situated with Bill Butler and team captain McQuigge. Mike O'Connor and Wade Denney are alternating on a line with Jason Borthwick and

Rookie defenceman Dave Ley has improved tremendously, said the coach. Blueliner Derek Hamilton has also adjusted well.


"We may lack size, we don't have the power hitters, but we have the speed," Steel pointed out. "As long as we can clear the puck out of our end and move it up fast, it doesn't matter about size...but if you happen to have a lapse, then you get hit."

"Some of the guys who haven't played much competitive hockey before didn't realize how (physical) it is in this division. It was a real eye-opener."

For Kent Smythe who has played competitive hockey most of his life, the extra roughness even caught him off guard. "The game's a little faster, a little rougher. There are more cheap shots," he said.

Last Friday the local boys doubled Port Perry 8-4 which brings Stouffville's record to an unofficial 6-4-2. Although Stouffville is averaging four to five goals a game, opponents are putting in that many too, noted team members.

"Either we win by quite a bit, or we lose by quite a bit," observed Baggs. "I think it's better to be the .500-plus club we are because if we won every game all season, we might get overconfident and choke in the playoffs."
