# Pure Egyptian mares imported

Egyptian Arabian mare could be sold for up to \$500,000 (U.S.).

"It's because of the blood," she explained. "An Arabian horse is the foundation breed of all warm-blooded animals. Generally, stallions from Arabia were given as gifts to government heads. However, the mares never left the land (and therefore) were never bred pure."

The Lehmanns, who have been in the horse breeding business over a decade, had started out with a straight Egyptian stallion and purebred Arabian mare which they purchased in the mid seventies. Although the mare had a lot of Egyptian blood in her, her ancestry was not a straight line.

During the 1985 Christmas season, Arlene's husband along with Doug Lunau and the General flew to Egypt to inspect horses at the government stud farm — Egyptian Agricultural Organization (EAO). The exorbitant price-list for the mares discouraged Lunau and Lehmann who were ready to abort the venture.

According to Arlene, the men unexpectedly received a different listing of horses the next morning with more reasonable rates. She suggested that General Eguindy's contacts had something to do with the switch.

The men chose two fillies which they subsequently named Ashwak and Bint El Wadi. Monetary deposits were left on the horses and Lehmann and Lunau returned to Canada New Year's Eve.

Because of Canadian importation laws, the mares had to be flown to the United States where they would be quarantined for 60 days in New York, and then held a further 60 days on American soil.

The Lehmanns hired a broker to handle the medical clearance guidelines, the blood samples and shipping permits. Several insurance companies were contacted, rates compared and procedures outlined.

The blood samples came back from Egypt and Ashwak checked out fine. However, the second vial

leaked and a test could not be run on the other horse. With the scheduled importation date quickly approaching, the Lehmanns frantically worked to get the second blood test approved.

On July 8th, 1986, Arlene Lehmann flew down to New York, checked into a hotel and at 6:30 a.m. caught the first glimpse of her new mares which were being unloaded at JFK Airport and transported to quarantine.

Four months later, on Nov. 11th, the fillies made it to their new Stouffville home.

With this first mission accomplished, the Lehmanns are already planning for another importation from Egypt. At least they know what they're up against the next time around, said Arlene.

**EXPLANATORY NOTE**  
 BY-LAW 160-86  
 An Interim Control By-law pursuant to Section 37 of the Planning Act, 1983. This by-law applies to certain lands zoned with the following designations, by By-law 2325-68, as amended:


1. A1 Agricultural Zone
2. RR1 Rural Residential Zone
3. RR2 Rural Residential Zone
4. RR4 Rural Residential Zone

Generally, the lands to which By-law 160-86 applies are situated between 16th Avenue and 17th Avenue (Major Mackenzie Drive East), west of the 9th Line, and between the 9th Line and the 10th Line, south of 16th Avenue. The limits of the designated area of the by-law are shown in Schedule 'A' attached hereto. A more detailed plan showing the limits of the designated area shown in Schedules 'B', 'C', 'D', and 'E' of the by-law which may be examined in the office of the Clerk during normal business hours.

Only those lands within the designated area of the by-law and zoned A1, RR1, RR2 or RR4, are affected by this by-law.



By-law 160-86 is an interim control by-law passed to ensure that certain types of development may not occur on the subject lands while a study of land use policies and zoning is being undertaken. The by-law provides that the following uses will not be permitted on the subject lands during the period that the by-law is in effect: a cemetery, a place of worship, a medical clinic, an elementary school, a high school. Uses legally existing prior to approval of the by-law are not affected. The by-law will be in effect from May 13th, 1986 to May 12th, 1987.

This by-law may be extended for a further year, until May 11th, 1988, and in accordance with the provisions of the Planning Act, 1983, may not be extended beyond that date. New zoning by-laws, or amendments to By-law 2325-68 will be passed upon completion of the required study.
