Legion Hall construction began forty years ago

What was happening in the former Twp. of Whitchurch and the former Village of Stouffville 40 years ago? What were the Front Page news stories in areas beyond? To find out, The Tribune's editor took a peak into the files of May 1946 and found the following items:

A meeting of the Stouffville Citizens Committee and the Stouffville Veterans Association was held to discuss the building of a new Veterans Memorial Community Hall. Fred Button served as chairman of the Citizens Committee. Through a public appeal, it was hoped \$10,000 could be raised. However, at the time, the fund was only at the half-way point. Henry Ogden, the contractor, said if work could commence by July, the building could be completed by fall.

Fifty people attended a meeting in Stouffville United Church to reorganize the Stouffville Horticultural Society. Members of the nominating committee included: Andy Williams, Margery Mertens, Mrs. Win Timbers, Mrs. Harold Dixon and Rev. Douglas Davis. Mr. E.R. Good was elected president; Cecil Davis, 1st vice-president; Lorne Gillion, 2nd vice-president; J.C. Porter, treasurer and Margery Mertens, secretary.

Audrey Slack advanced to the final round of the public speaking competitions, sponsored by the Lions Club and held at Kitchener.

The Baker Hill Ladies won second prize at the annual music festival held at Old Davenport Road United Church. Members included: Mrs. James Oldham, (leader); Mrs. Howard Ratcliff, Mrs. Don Ratcliff, Mrs. Alex Ratcliff, Mrs. Stewart Stouffer, Mrs. Keith Hutchinson and Mrs. Evelyn Dougherty. The accompanist was Clarion Baker.

Mr. Ambrose Stover was involved in a serious car-truck collision on Kennedy Road near Haggerman. He suffered chest injuries in the accident and his vehicle was badly damaged. Bobbie Stover, his nephew and a passenger in the auto, required stitches to close a gash to his face. Several front teeth were broken.

A fine team of black Percheron horses was sold at an auction sale on the farm of Seymour Harper Mount Albert, for a price of \$460.

George Abell was elected president of the Stouffville Veterans Association for 1946. Elected 1st vice-president was Dr. Neil Smith; 2nd vice-president, E.C. Cadieux and secretary-treasurer, Bert Lickorish.

Recently returned from World War II duty overseas were: Donald Middleton, son of Mr and Mrs. George Middleton; Walter Smith, son of Mr and Mrs. Everett Smith and Bert Johnston, son of Mr and Mrs. Robert Johnson.

The Stouffville School Board agreed to a salary increase for its Public School principal C.E. Watson of \$50, bringing his wage up to \$1,850. Other salary increases went to Miss Hosie and Miss Brooks from \$1,400 to \$1,450; Miss Beck from \$1,350 to \$1,400 and Miss Harlock from \$1,150 to \$1,250. Miss Campbell of Port Rowan, Ont., was added to the High School staff at a salary of \$2,000.

The 35th annual Spring Fair at Brooklin was advertised in The Tribune with the admission price for adults at twenty-five cents; ten cents for children.

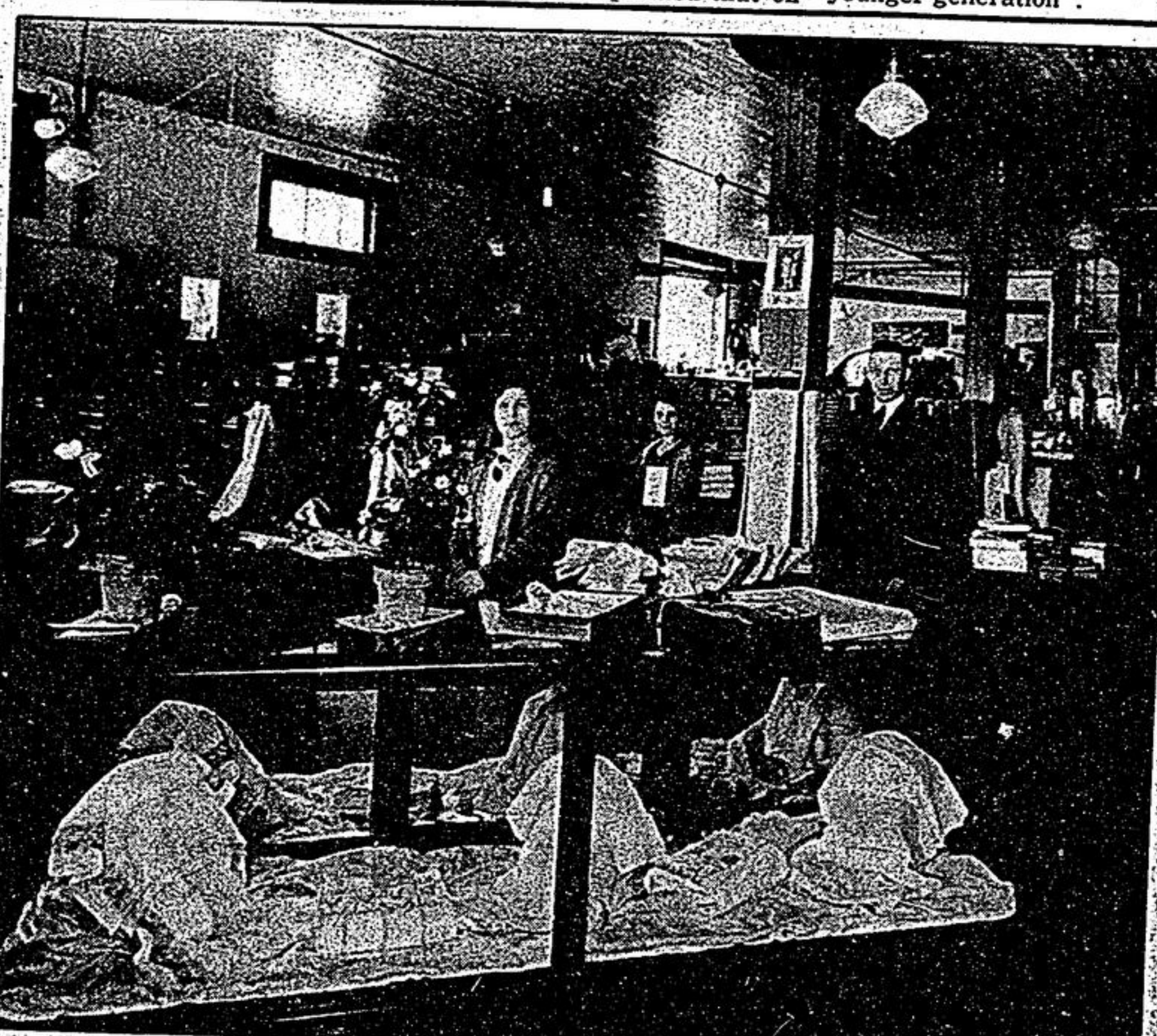
Ken Klinck of Stouffville, was awarded a \$10 Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association award as one of the top academic students attending the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph.

Andy Williams, manager of Shadow Lake Farms at Musselman's Lake, (owned by the T. Eaton Co.), complained that on

two occasions, roving dogs had come to the property, killing a number of chickens. Due to the fact Whitchurch Twp. had no bylaw allowing compensation for livestock killed or injured by canines, Mr. Williams was advised to seek damages from the dogs' owners.

The Stouffville Parks Commission held its first meeting of 1946 with Norman McLean the chairman. Other board members were: Charles Nolan, Dr. S.S. Ball, Jack Smits and E.A. Button. It was agreed that Charles McDonald, projectionist at the Stanley Theatre be hired as park caretaker. Members said that due to a shortage of help during the war years, the park property "had been allowed to run wild" with much damage being done by "the younger generation".
