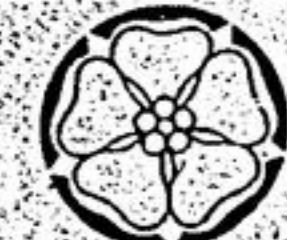
The team's senior line of Trevor Bardell, David Sporeburg and Darren Zellers was broken up and the players were distributed amongst three lines.

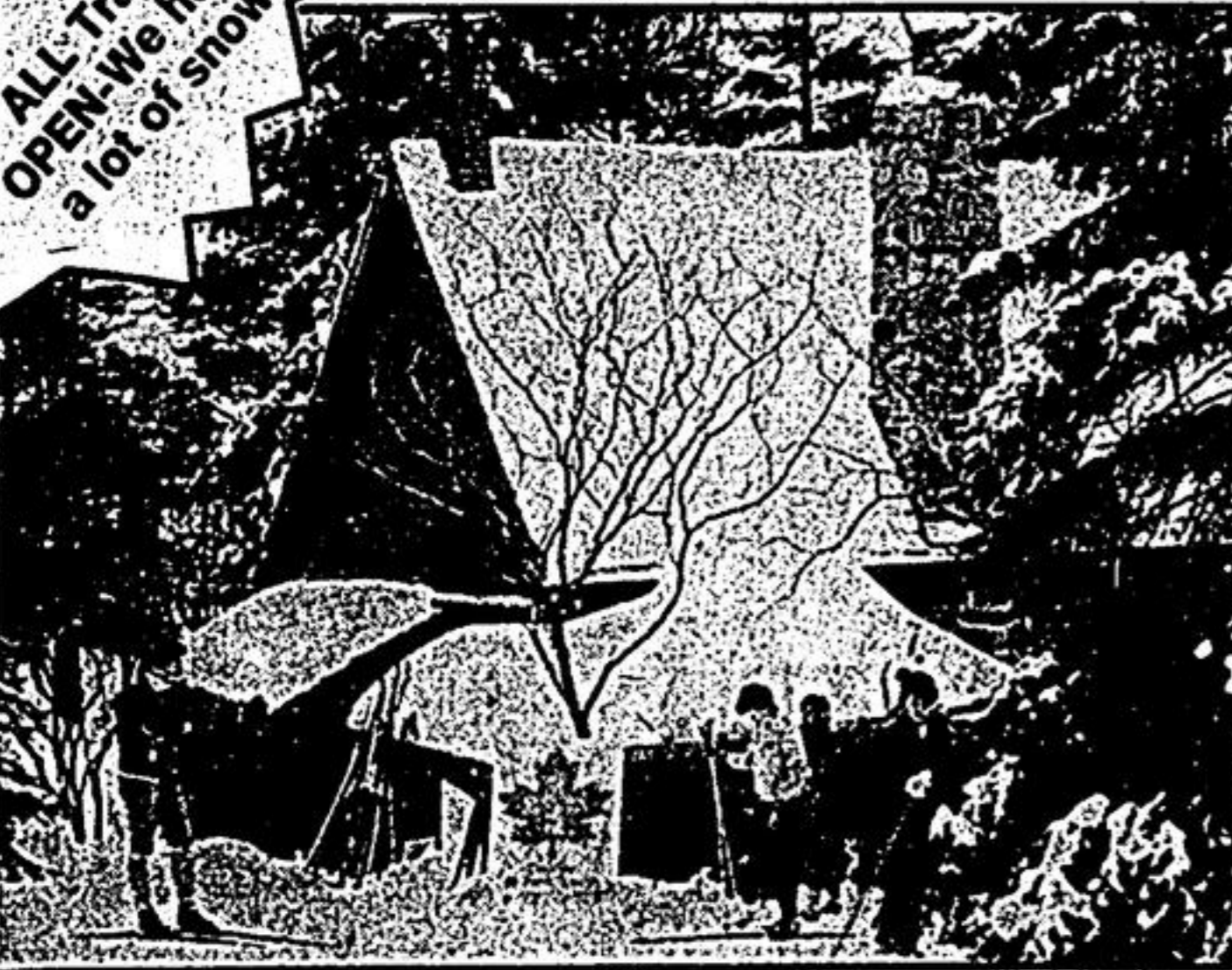

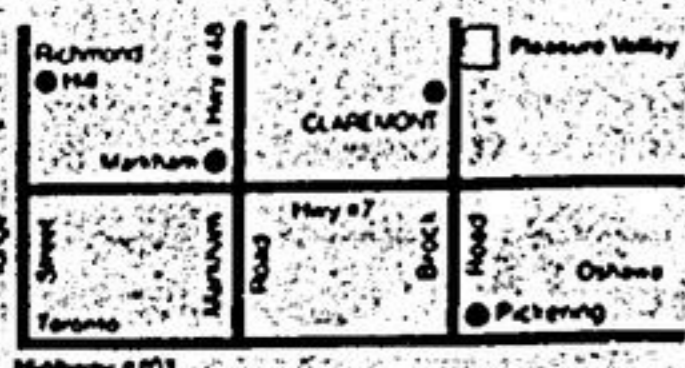
