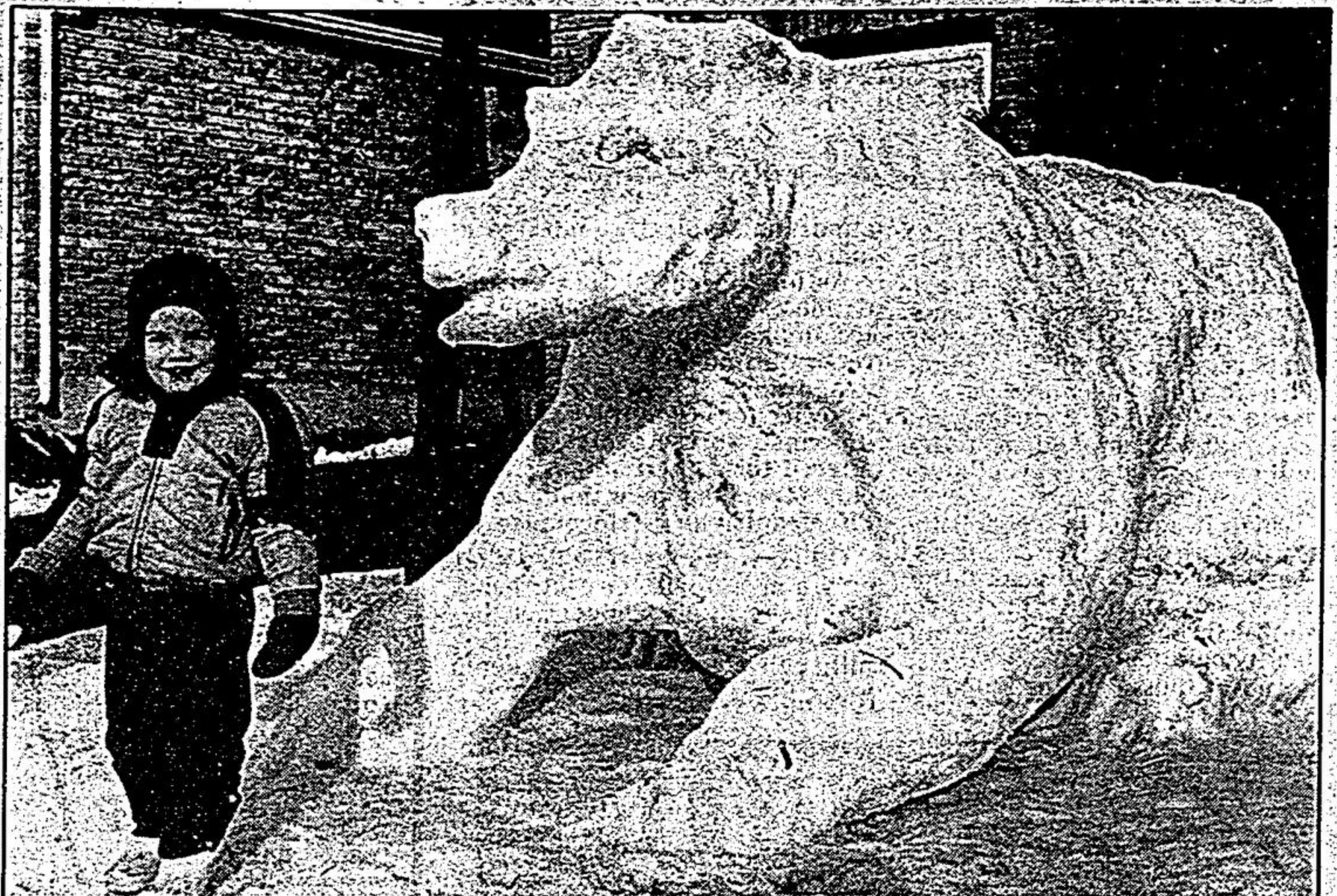

Farm-theme day camp sent out to pasture

A plan to introduce city kids to rural life received a cool reception by Markham Planning Committee Tuesday and now faces the town's agricultural watchdog.

The proposal to operate a children's summer day camp with an "agricultural theme" by developers Leon Hochglaube and Edward Bogomolny was referred to a rural subcommittee for comment.

The pair plans to operate the camp on a 69-acre parcel of land on Kennedy Rd. below 19th Ave. each summer.

Solicitor Jack Winberg said the sensitive agricultural land will be utilized for those purposes while existing farm buildings will be renovated and kept on-site.

Three new "shelter facilities" to house caretakers, equipment, washrooms, office space and staff services are also included in the plan.

Mr. Winberg also said a corn field will be planted annually.

But Planning committee was wary of the proposal and concerned about the day camp encroaching upon agricultural land.

The Ministry of Agriculture and Food has reviewed the proposal and indicated that it doesn't comply with Ontario's Foodland Guidelines.

An amendment to a provincial airport zoning order passed in 1972 is required to allow the day camp's approval.

The land was set aside when the province considered a Pickering airport. Portions of it would have been within jet flight paths.

Mr. Winberg insisted that the land would be used for its intended purposes at the camp.

"We're having children engaged in primarily agricultural uses," argued Mr. Winberg. "Don't let the words 'day camp' cloud or obscure what's going on here."

If passed, the camp would accommodate up to 200 children between July and August the first year and increase in capacity to teach as many as 450 in future.

However, Regional Councillor Ron Moran said allowing this application would open the door for nearby rural landowners to demand commercial status on their properties.

"You haven't convinced me at all that it's anything but a business," he noted.

Regional Councillor Bud Bonner raised a point in asking Planning committee Chairman Elson Miles, a farmer, if a 68-acre parcel of land could be economically viable if used for farming.

Councillor Miles replied that a 68-acre farm wouldn't be viable "by today's standards."

"I'm not suggesting this is the right use now or anytime," commented Councillor Bonner. "But if you can't preserve the agricultural use then what are you going to do with it?"

One supporter of the plan was Markham Councillor Gord Landon who said the camp would offer something within Markham for Markham children.

And Regional Councillor Frank Scarpitti noted that the proposal is one that "if modified could be supported."

"We have a project there in a good location," said Councillor Scarpitti. "Why should (families) have to go out of town?"

The proposal will be discussed by members when brought before the rural subcommittee.

Two robberies hit local home
