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
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Figure skater is new Queen

Councillor opposes new post

Whitchurch-Stouffville has okayed the hiring of an engineering co-ordinator, but not before one councillor criticized the move as "getting the cart before the horse."

Jim Sanders voiced strong objections Tuesday evening when Town Council dealt with a personnel committee report recommending establishment of the position at an annual salary between \$37,300 and \$43,140.

"We haven't done our homework, we haven't done our management and administration. And we should be doing that before we hire an engineering co-ordinator," the Ward 6 representative said before the report was approved.

Seven separate areas of the Town's municipal operation have been reviewed, according to Councillor Sanders. He feels these should now be administered by the mayor and clerk co-ordinator.

"We're now putting ourselves in the position where we're going to hire someone and hope they come up with all the answers," he claimed. "We'll have more high-paid staff doing the same work as now."

Mr. Sanders also said there is isn't an adequate job description detailing just what's expected of an engineering co-ordinator.

"We're putting the person in a very difficult position before they even get started," he said, claiming no clear pattern of organization has been established for the job.

Ads for the opening have already appeared in the classified section of a Toronto daily newspaper.

The successful candidate is to be a certified technician with a minimum of five years municipal or related experience in a supervisory position.

Responsible to Town Council through Clerk Co-ordinator Pat Muir, the engineering co-ordinator will head up the operation of the works and parks departments and Town facilities. This includes preparation and monitoring of the respective operating and capital budgets.

Other duties are formulation and implementation of policies within those departments, as well as administration of the engineering aspects of subdivision and site plan agreements.

Mayor Fran Sainsbury said the hiring of an engineering co-ordinator is intended to help ease the heavy workload carried by works superintendent Ron Gibson.
