Markham District High School

Passports needed for classy travel

Visitors to next week's Open House at Markham District High School will be treated to a multi-cultural smorgasbord featuring high-stepping cabaret dancers and waiters in Roman togas.

The February 19 visitors will receive passports that enable them to tour the various ethnic centres stationed throughout the school. The event runs from 7 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

"Our program is different this year in that there's a multicultural theme," said co-chairperson and history teacher Bill Mathison. "It's a reflection of our school, which is becoming more multicultural."

Along with co-chairperson Fay Espinosa, Mr. Mathison organized an Open House committee to co-ordinate various ethnic centres.

Each ethnic centre will be run by one of the school's departments, he said.

The Family Studies department, for instance, is setting up a Taste of the World Restaurant featuring recipes from around the world.

The department also plans to host a seminar on discrimination in the workplace.

The English department is putting on dramatizations of Cana-

dian, ethnic literature and Business Studies is offering a lecture on law in different countries.

One of the more entertaining cultural centres, run by the Theatre Arts department, features a puppet workshop, a docudrama about immigrants in Canada and a mime titled "Black vs. White."

Other cultural centres will feature a French cabaret, a comparison of Canadian and American cultures and the contribution of different countries to the world of math.

A touring band sponsored by the Music department will regale visitors as they move from one centre to another.

"Everyone's getting excited, and there's a lot of learning going on," said Fay Espinosa, who founded a multicultural club at the school.

"We can tolerate one another better if we understand one another," she said.

The Guidance department invites the parents of Grade 8 students attending the school next year to come to the Open House and meet the teachers.

There will be door prizes and awards for the best displays as well as guided tours through the cultural centres.
