Gormley area girl credit to the Force

YORK REGION — Most drivers still do a double take when they see a policewoman handling traffic at a busy intersection or conducting an investigation at a fatal accident.

Even in a day and age when equal rights are top priority in all professions, the policewoman is still needing to prove she belongs.

But not Christine Warden. Five years' experience has convinced her she's as much a part of York Region's finest as the 400-plus males on the Force. She works out of No. 28 Division at Richmond Hill.

"Most of the officers are really good," says the 26-year-old constable from Wesley Corners, Whitechurch-Stouffville, "most of the people, too."

Neat, trim in a spotless blue uniform, Christine talked freely about her role in one of Ontario's fastest growing areas. We met Saturday at the home of her parents, Charlie and Ruth Warden, R.R. 1, Gormley.

A graduate of Whitechurch Highlands Public School and Dr. G.W. Williams Secondary School, Christine recalls making police work her career choice at about age 18.

"I didn't want to be stuck in an office," she remembers, thinking back to the days when she was one of York Region's foremost female athletes.

For a time, she was assigned to safety instruction speaking to students in various schools. Later, she was transferred to the plain-clothed drug unit working out of Aurora. Now, she's a uniformed officer on

cruiser patrol out of Richmond Hill. Is it a T.J. Hooker or a Hillstreet Blues kind of life? "I ask."

"Don't you believe it," Christine replies, adding, "I seldom watch police stories on TV."

"If I threw my nightstick at a suspect, he'd probably throw it back," she jokes, with reference to a favorite T.J. Hooker trick.

Although admitting to a couple of close calls when intense action threatens, the Department's Emergency Response Unit is called in, she explains.

Christine shows she's an officer with a heart. She admits that, under certain circumstances, ticketing motorists "can be a little difficult."

"Try to be fair, so I can sleep at night," she says.

In some instances, depending on circumstances, it's left to an officer's discretion, she explains.

Would you do it all over again? "I enquire. Yes, I would," Christine replies. "It's a way of life few people see."

Unfortunately, not all of what she sees is pleasant. But experience enables her to handle most situations. "I don't consider myself a seasoned veteran," she says, "but I'm much more mature."

Although court appearances occupy some of Christine's time, you won't find her standing in the witness box Sept. 35. Rather, she'll be standing in the sanctuary of Queensville United Church. It's her wedding day and yes, she's marrying a policeman.
