

# Mahlon Shantz — a super volunteer

STOUFFVILLE — Volunteers are the life-blood of Whitchurch-Stouffville. Without free or gratis help, many services wouldn't exist.

And some give a lot. Meeting the criteria of Super Volunteer is Mahlon Shantz, Baker Hill, R.R. 2, Stouffville. He's been giving of himself and his talents all his life. And at age 72, he shows no sign of slowing down.

While thousands of people have benefitted from Mahlon's ministry, he sees himself as a beneficiary too. "You don't measure satisfaction in dollars and cents," he says, with regard to out-of-pocket expenses. Besides, he explains, volunteerism helps bridge the gap between work and retirement. "The transition," he says, "is much smoother and less painful."

A member in the congregation of Cedar Grove Mennonite

Church, some of Mahlon's outreach was originally associated with this denomination. Now, it knows no bounds. He's a familiar figure everywhere. — Parkview Home, Bestview, Green Gables Manor, Silver Jubilee Club, Home Support Services, York County Hospital, the list goes on and on.

One of his most satisfying challenges was serving as a volunteer probation officer with the Newmarket Provincial Court. He carried out these duties over a period of eight years, counselling a total of 37 people, most in their teens. Out of this number, more than half are clear of the law today, a figure far above the provincial average.

He describes this experience as "very rewarding." At Parkview, Green Gables and elsewhere, Mahlon's on a first-name basis with most residents. They enjoy seeing him come and hate to see him go. As a driver for Home Support, he's travelled hundreds of miles throughout the area. Many ask for him personally. A service repairman, first with farm machinery and later, refrigeration, Mahlon says, "I've carried a toolbox fifty years."



Mahlon Shantz, R.R. 2, Stouffville, is a super volunteer who gives freely of his time in the work of Home Support Services as well as at area nursing homes and hospitals. Mr. Shantz also served as a regional probation officer for a period of eight years.

## THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK WIDENING AND RECONSTRUCTION WARDEN AVENUE (YR 65)

THE COUNCIL OF THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK PROPOSES TO PASS A BY-LAW AUTHORIZING:

- the widening and reconstruction of Warden Avenue (YR 65) in the Town of Markham from 14th Avenue to a point approximately 170 metres south of The King's Highway No. 7 to a basic width of 36 metres with additional widenings at cuts, fills and intersections to provide a basic four lane roadway, with additional turning lanes at a proposed future collector road to intersect Warden Avenue (YR 65) approximately 390 metres south of The King's Highway No. 7; the widening of Warden Avenue (YR 65) over the C.N.R. tracks at mileage 14.1 York Subdivision to accommodate a four lane roadway, and the widening of the bridge carrying Warden Avenue (YR 65) over the Rouge River to accommodate a five lane roadway; and
- in connection with all of the foregoing: the site preparation, fencing, grading, graveling and paving; the construction of concrete curbs and gutters; storm sewers, culverts and drainage works; the construction of all other related works and undertakings; and the acquisition of the necessary lands and interests in lands.

Pursuant to section 301 of the Municipal Act, the Engineering Committee of the Regional Council will, at its meeting to be held at 10:00 a.m. on the 15th day of June, 1987 in the Board Room of the Engineering Building located on the west side of Woodbine Avenue (YR 8) one and one-quarter miles north of Aurora Road (YR 15), hear any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-law and who applies to be heard. Anyone wishing to be heard is requested to advise Robert Vernon, Regional Clerk, (Telephone 362-2464 or 895-1231 Extension 210). If any party entitled to be heard does not attend at the hearing the Committee may proceed in his absence and he will not be entitled to any further notice in the proceedings.
