STOUFFVILLE — For most graduating students, the school year's end is the beginning of bigger and better experiences. For Duffy Wallis, it concludes a ten-month period he'll never forget. "I'm happy with all I've been able to accomplish," says Duffy, Stouffville Dist. Secondary School's Student Council President. "I've learned a lot about politics and hopefully helped establish a firm base for school spirit."

According to Duffy, his initial interest in bidding for Council's top job was the school's general atmosphere and abundant school spirit.

whole town can get involved and, at the same time, encourage others to get involved as well."

Although Duffy does admit to being a little disappointed with his year's results, (having set his goals a little too high), he's especially proud of one accomplishment.

"We've held school dances at least once a month over the course of the year," he says. "Previously, they didn't happen often enough to keep the students occupied. But this time we not only improved on that, but incorporated a wide variety of themes and introduced two semi-formals."

"I wanted these things in particular because I've seen them happen at other schools and know S.D.S.S. has the potential for so much more," says Duffy. "Although we only touched on it this year, I'm confident next year's Student Council will keep these goals in mind."

When asked what words of

advice he has for next year's president, Duffy says: "Your school is like a trust fund because there are 800 students who are all banking into your account. That account is so important because what you're filling it with is memories and the quality of every one of those memories is banking on you."

"What I'm really saying," continues Duffy, "is aim high, have good goals, make sure the students want the same things you do and never give up."

Although Duffy says he'd be thrilled to run for president next year, he's decided instead, to devote his time to improving his Math mark.

"I truly hope the students standing for this office in the future, do everything they can to make S.D.S.S. the best place, the most rewarding place and the most enjoyable place it can be. Because that's what serving on the Students' Council is all about."
