## At Summitview School Several staff changes for September term

STOUFFVILLE—Summitview Public School students may be hard-pressed to recognize many of their teachers when classes resume this fall.  
According to Principal Lorne Boadway, the September staff will include an additional eight members.  
Susan Levine from Franklin

Street School, Markham, will teach a Grade 3, with newly-appointed Karen Attridge accepting the responsibility for a split Grades 3 and 4. Stephen Smith from Baythorn will teach Grade 5; Steven Rensink from Alberta and Joan Gordon of Kleinburg will take Grade 8.  
Bianca Creek will transfer to Special Education.

Also scheduled to join the Summitview staff in September will be a full-time French teacher, replacing Patty Pluss; as well as a part-time French instructor and a kindergarten teacher's aide.  
"The additional teachers will give staff the flexibility to take on more things such as enrichment programs," said Mr. Boadway, speaking at a Principal/Parents Meeting May 15.

**CLASS SPLITS**  
Although class splits, incorporating two grades into one have been a concern for some parents, Mr. Boadway assured mothers there will only be two this fall.

Included in schedulings for September will be two Grade 1 classes; two Grade 2; one Grade 3; one Grades 3 and 4 split; one Grade 4; one Grade 5; one Grades 4 and 5 split; one Grade 6; one Grade 7; two Grade 8 and two Special Education classes.

"I have no reservations concerning these splits," said Mr. Boadway. "Some years ago we tried a pilot project where Norma Card took on a Grades 3 and 6 class. We were very selective of the students enrolled and it seemed like a good mix. You can make just about anything work. However, the key to success is a good teacher."

**HEAD LICE**  
The ever-growing number of public school students experiencing head lice, has many parents, including Principal Boadway, concerned about controlling the problem.

Said Principal Boadway: "A staffing problem with the public health department has left the responsibility for checking children up to parents and teachers."

He claims the school's responsibility lies in keeping with head lice identified until the nits are gone. However, he says many people are under the misconception once the shampoo treatment is finished, it's all over. But such is not the case. Instead, the dead lice have to be picked off.

"At one time, head lice was regarded as something dirty," said Principal Boadway. "But anyone can get them simply by exchanging combs or wearing the same baseball helmet."

Principal Boadway also says once one case has been identified, notices are sent home to all parents asking them to check their children.

"It's not a simple thing to do," he concluded, "but if you use a magnifying glass, they're easier to detect."
