Mr. McRoberts, 'Mac' to his friends, has been associated with the teaching profession 33 years, 28 years as principal. He came to Whitchurch-Highlands the same

time The Class of '87 entered kindergarten.

"Whitchurch-Highlands, where's that?" he remembers asking himself when the principal placement cards were handed out. "I was soon to find out," he recalls with a smile, describing the location as "the crossroads between snowstorms and gravel trucks."

However, the benefits have far outweighed the problems, Mr. McRoberts points out. "The staff has been good and the parents very supportive."

Born near Belfast, Northern Ireland, 'Mac' came to Canada in 1939. His first teaching position was Thornhill Public School, followed by Powell Road, (Thornhill); Concord and McKenzie, (Kleinburg).

"All along I kept reminding my staff they'd better watch out; all my schools except two closed after I left," he says with an Irish twinkle in his eye.

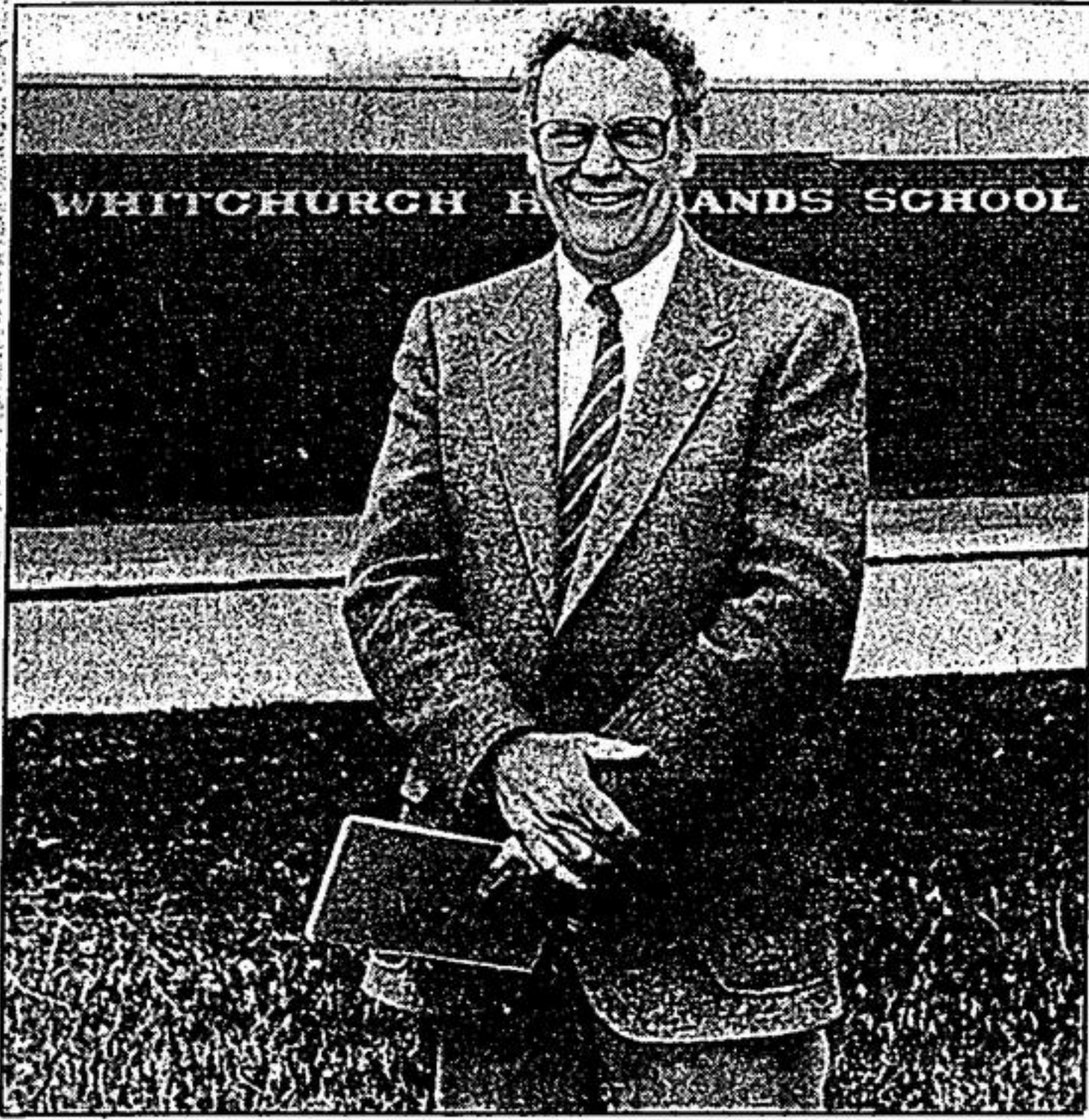
He's not predicting a similar fate for Highlands, however, and speaks well of his successor, Sharon Euler of Roselawn Public School, Thornhill.
