Senior boys softball

Spartans bid for ball championship ends with Aurora

It was so close. The Stouffville District Secondary School (SDSS) Spartans Senior boys softball team just missed making it to the York Region championships when they dropped their semi-final game to Aurora High School 4-1 Monday afternoon at home.

As with their loss last week to Bradford for the league title, the Spartans were killed by their silent bats.

The Aurora pitcher was throwing smoke, and it was the fifth inning before Stouffville got their first hit, a bloop single by first baseman Dan Larmer.

The hit also produced the only Spartan run of the game as it cashed in Derek Mann who had walked earlier in the inning. The walk had spoiled what until then had been a perfect game for the Aurora pitcher.

"We got beaten by our batting," said coach Rod Leonard. "We just couldn't get the hits when we needed them."

Defensively, the Spartans were playing well behind the pitching of Scott Couperthwaite (Dave Chilvers made a great grab in centre field in the first

inning) and the game was tied 0-0 going into the fourth, an inning that proved to be disastrous for Stouffville.

They made a number of mental errors that added up to two Aurora runs.

High school games are only six innings long and the closest the Spartans got was in the bottom of the fifth when they made it 2-1.

Aurora added two more runs in the top of the final frame with Dave Chilvers on the mound for Stouffville, and the game was over.

The Spartans went down in order in the bottom of the sixth, unable to capitalize on the ejection of the Aurora pitcher who was thrown out for arguing with the umpire in the top half of the inning.

The Spartans finished the season in second spot in the York Region loop, and the highlight of their season was probably their strong play in the Bradford Tournament two weeks ago in which they reached the final before losing to Huron Heights.

"Overall, I thought we played very well this season," Leonard said. "We can't complain about how we did."

Wheelchair athlete Keith Brettell who won a provincial championship in swimming in 1986.

Golfer Marlene Streit who was the Canadian and U.S. senior ladies champ in 1985.


Tracey Garbutt who was a champion in the 1986 Canadian Special Olympics.

Stouffville District Secondary School (SDSS) athletes Brenda Hachey and Mishelle Hall put in very respectable performances at this weekend's provincial track and field championships at McMaster University in Hamilton.

Junior girls long distance runner Hachey was 14th in the 3,000-metre race, and Mishelle Hall finished 12th in the Midget girls 80-metre hurdles event.

Hall ran a time of 13:19 in her race against a strong field. Her time wasn't her best, but the weather was extremely hot when she ran her race Friday.

The heat was also a factor in Hachey's race Saturday, in which a very fast pace was set despite the blistering temperatures. In fact, a new record in Junior girls 3,000 was set in this race.

The top athletes from across Ontario were in Hamilton, and each event had some 24 competitors.

Markham resident George Burkholder, 29, is the man who patrols centre field for the Betz Pools Stouffville mens fastball squad.

The Burkholder name is a familiar one in the Markham-Stouffville area, and George is a farmer on the Ninth Line.

For the last two years Burkholder played 1st pitch in Stouffville for the Villagers, but when the opportunity to play fastball in town came around this year he decided to go for it.
