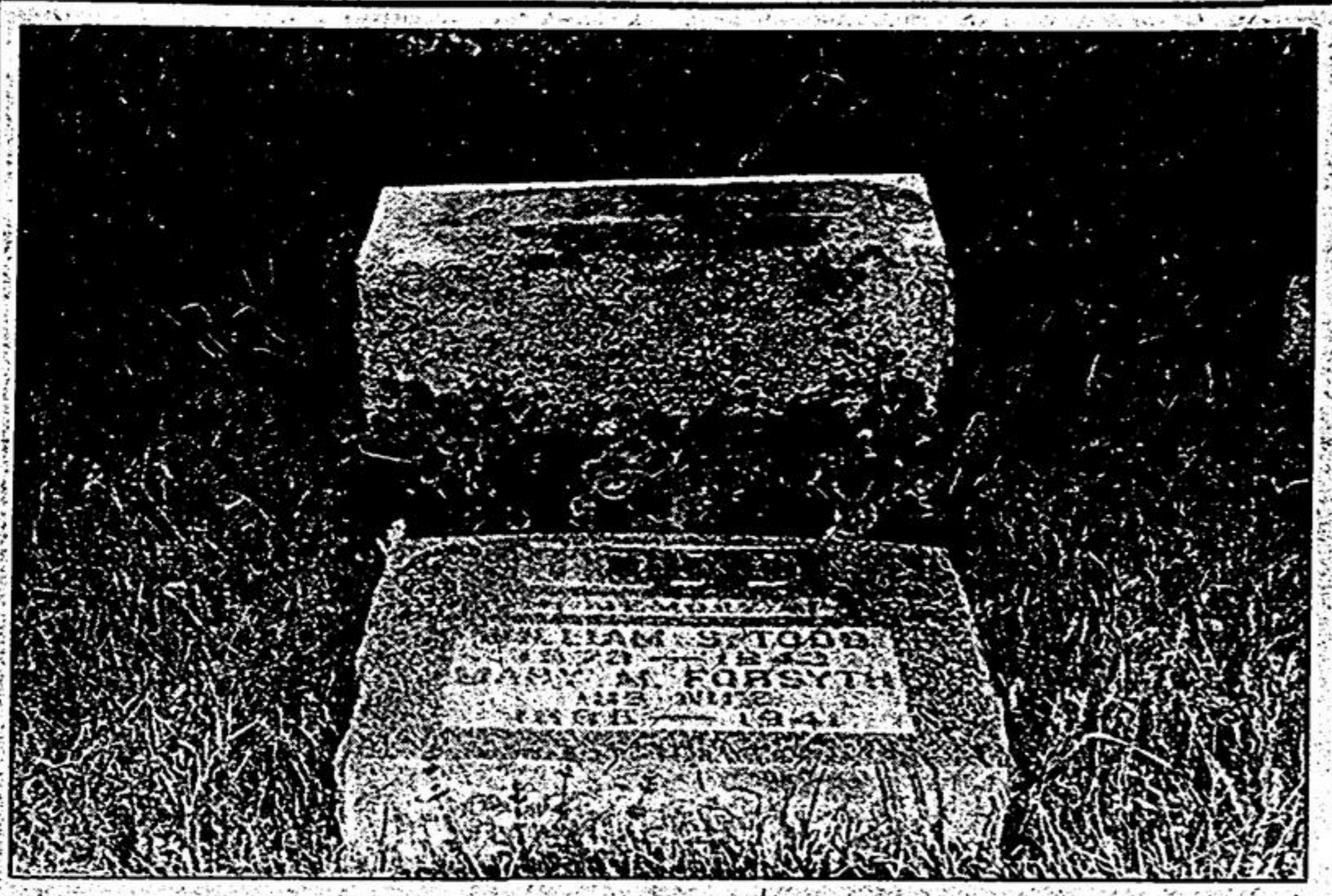
turn, they'll take up residence in Stouffville.
