Lorne Boadway Citizen of 1987

STOUFFVILLE — Lorne Boadway, Maytree Avenue, is Whitchurch-Stouffville's 'Citizen of the Year'.

The 55-year-old soon-to-retire principal of Summitview School will be honored at a ceremony, Thursday, (to-morrow), in the gymnasium of Stouffville Dist. Secondary School.

The event, held in conjunction with the Miss Whitchurch-Stouffville Pageant, begins at 9 p.m. The Pageant starts at 7:30.

Mr. Boadway was the Selection Committee's unanimous choice. His involvement in community activities has touched all areas of Town. His leadership in music has been outstanding, both at Summitview School and Stouffville United Church. He's an active member and enthusiastic worker with the Stouffville Lions Club. As a younger man, he both played and coached in hockey and baseball.

He was Stouffville's program chairman during Canada's 1967 centennial.

Born in Toronto, the son of Carl and Eva Boadway, Lorne moved to Stouffville with his parents when only a few months old.

His elementary and secondary education years were spent at what was then Stouffville Continuation School. Encouraged by his uncle, the late Lambert Malloy, he enrolled at Toronto Normal School. His first teaching position was on Finch Avenue East, North York in 1952. Jack Clubine was the principal. He accepted the principalship at Summitview in January, 1956, and has remained here ever since.

Stouffville school trustees at the time included — Len Wilkes, (chairman); June Button, Mary Smith, Cec Hendricks, Keith Middlemiss and Bill Malloy. The secretary was Elsie Sanders.

Lorne was only 24.

Highlights remain so vivid and outstanding, each is a story in itself. One of the most memorable, says Lorne, is the Centennial Choir of 1967 with representatives from almost all churches in town. He still recalls it as "a real thrill."

That's what most people remember of him — his music.

It was Lorne who initiated the first edition of Music Mania. He's remained a part of this program through 27 years. For 13 years, he served as choir leader at Stouffville United Church.

He took vocal lessons at the Toronto Conservatory under the direction of the late Dalton McLaughlin. Lorne plays the piano, the bass fiddle and the ukelele.

He joined the Lions Club in 1956. His sponsor was Cec Hendricks. He was president in 1965 and presently serves as chairman of the Ways and Means Committee.

Mr. Boadway will always be remembered as a dedicated educator. "Each year was unique," he says.

Gladys Brooks, now of Mt. Albert, was his Grade 4 teacher. She was still on staff when he returned as principal. He describes her as "a grand lady."

Many children today are second generation students.

In 35 years on the job, he only missed ten teaching days.

Beginning in October, Lorne will join the staff of Birkett & Hassard Insurance, Main Street West. The majority of staff are old 'Red Sox' team mates. Lorne will complete the 'infield'.

Prior to taking on this new vocation, he'll spend time at the family cottage on Kannis Lake and take a trip, (with wife Marion), to Europe.

Lorne speaks with pride of his family — daughter Barbara, (Mrs. Doug Todd); son Bob and daughter-in-law Julie; sons Mike and Mark; and five grandchildren, Jocelyn and Aynsley Todd; Brett, Amber and Hailey Boadway. Lorne has one sister, Virginia Brown and a brother, Allen.

"It's been a great life," says Lorne of his teaching career. "I don't regret one minute."
