## Brown wins triathlon

There was no ringer (in the form of U.S. star Mark Allen) to prevent Toronto's Richard Brown from winning the second annual Markham Triathlon last weekend.

But Brown, who finished the 1.5-kilometre swim, 40-km. bike tour and 10-km. run in one hour, 59.33 minutes, still needed some luck.

And it came in the form of a wrong turn by second-place finisher Nick Taylor of Sault Ste. Marie, who crossed the finish line less than a minute behind Brown. Ottawa's Nick Heller was third.

"I had a huge lead halfway through the bike part," Taylor explained while cooling off. "But I missed a sign on the route, and was almost over to Hwy 47 before I turned around."

"I was 12th after that, but caught up on the run," he continued. "I'm glad my legs felt good, but this is a little disappointing."

Taylor, 25, thought "they (triathlon organizer MTI Promotions) need people on the bicycle route waving riders on with red flags."

"When you're going 30 miles-per-hour you don't see the signs. But these things are very difficult to organize, especially in an urban area."

However, Race Director Gary Joseph asserted that "it's the racer's responsibility (to know the route). They all had two days to study the course maps. There is no way Nick should have missed a turn. He's the only one (who did)."

Brown, who admitted he didn't win in the best fashion, agreed with Taylor that "the organization wasn't quite as good (as last year). But I think they did the best they could, because some sponsors pulled out at the last minute."

Brown, who works in Markham's Woodbine Avenue industrial area, would have liked to see more water stations on the route.

The 22-year-old triathlon veteran was second behind Allen in 1986. This year's layout "was a lot more demanding. The swim (at Richmond Hill's Lake Wilcox) was the right distance, but the bike ride felt a bit longer and hillier."

For his trouble, Brown and the top female (Australia's Doris Trueman) each take home \$1,000. Seconds (for the women it was Janet Stalker) earn \$750 apiece while thirds collect \$500.

Neither the total number of participants in the race, nor the name of the top placing Markham-area resident, were available at press time.

## Markham synchro swimmers do well

Markham Synchronized Swimming Club members came up with strong performances at the recent Trillium Provincial Championships in Windsor.

In a competition involving 129 swimmers from 16 clubs, Connie Griffin led the way for Markham with a first amongst the 10 competitors in her figures age group. In the 13-14 section, there were 45 competitors with Fiona Santos winning. The other girls placed well, coming in fifth, 12th, 13th, 15th, 19th and 24th.

The 15-and-older group swimmers also did well, finishing second, seventh, eighth and 21st out of 24 competitors.

In separate Duet Age Group finals, Jennifer Kindy and Teresa O'Brien were second out of 7, and Fiona Santos & Chloe Greenhalgh finished second out of six pairs.

In the routines portion of the Meet, Markham had two teams in the 13-and-older division.

In team competition, eight is the optimum number of swimmers. A half-mark is deducted for each swimmer under that number.

Markham's team (Anita Bapooji, Connie Griffin, Amy Jackson and Erica Scott), though lacking in numbers and experience, still placed sixth out of 11 teams.

The club's eight-member squad of Andrea Flint, Chloe Greenhalgh, Jennifer Kindy, Laurie Mitchell, Teresa O'Brien, Fiona Santos, Debbie Thompson and Meg Williams faced the same tough competition.

They executed their esthetically-pleasing routine with precision. As a result, they were awarded the only seven (out of a possible 10) in the team competition.

These marks were more than enough to put Markham ahead of the other competitors, and give it the overall championship in its age group.

Like figure skating, this now-accepted Olympic sport has two aspects to a competition. They consist of the technical side or figures and the free-style portion or routines.

Coach Diane Van der pol was thrilled with Markham's approach to both sides, noting "I have been told that I demand excellence from my swimmers, and if this is true, then they lived up to my demands. I am very proud of my ladies".
