Linda Fawns claimed Stouffville is not the only community facing this problem. "It's the same all over Ontario," she said. She suggested tenants rather than merchants are to blame for much of the trouble here.

Harry Harper is home from Scarborough Centenary Hospital following major surgery.

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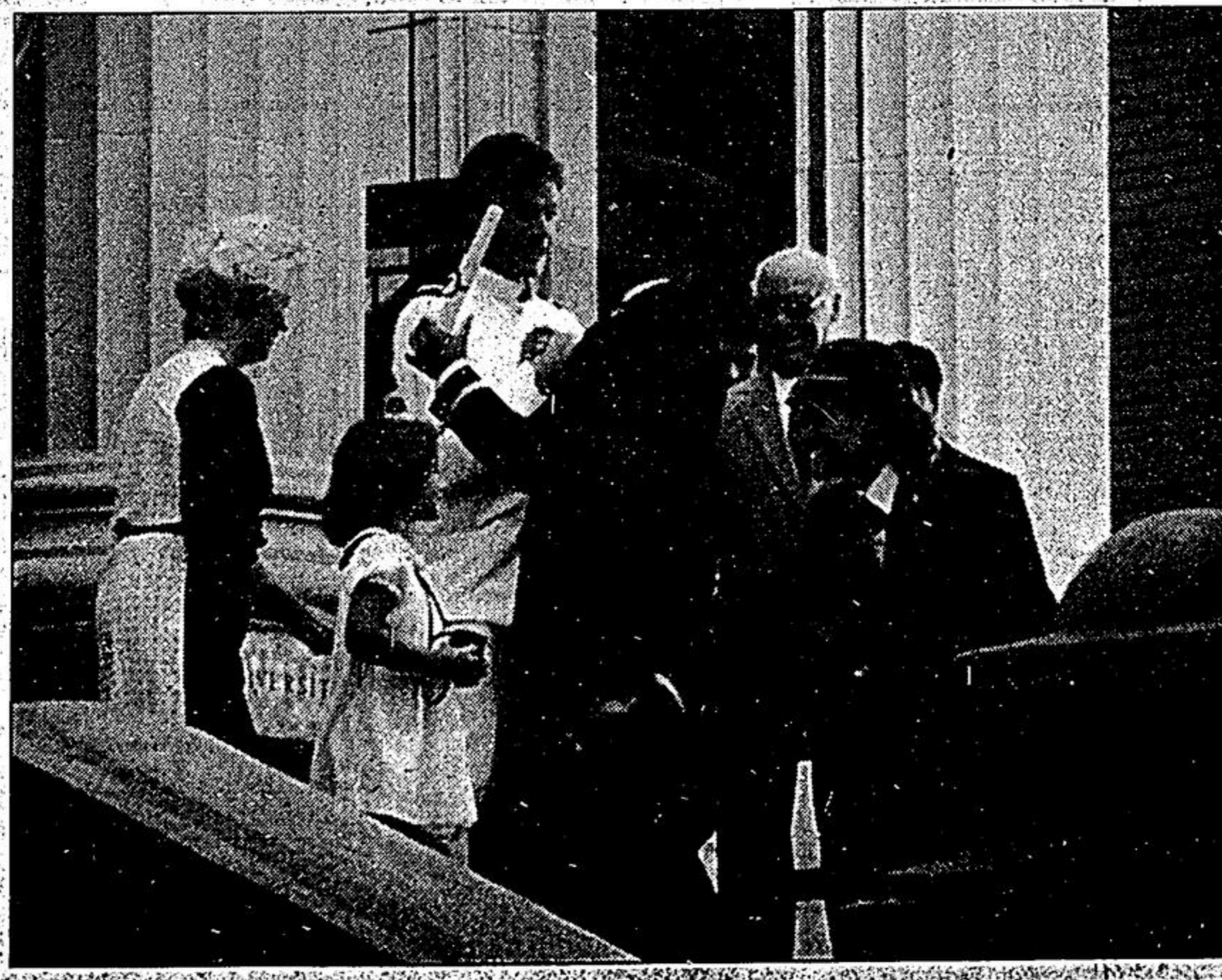


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
